Equity Suit Filed Here

An equity suit to contest the will of the late Salvatore Morrone has been filed in circuit court here by Otto Sari, well-known Klamath Falls restaurant operator, acting as guardian ad litem of 9-year-old Teresina Profit.

Morrone died June 29, leaving an estate valued at \$6592.50 and a will bequeathing his property to two nephews, Gennaro and Francesco Morrone, both residents of Pedace, Province of Cosenza, Italy.

Sari's complaint states that in October, 1946, Morrone entered into a contract with Teresina Profit's mother, Mrs. Alice Profit, requesting that Mrs. Profit come to Klamath Falls and act as housekeeper for the elderlyachelor. In return, Morrone is said to have agreed in the contract to bequeath all his property to little Teresina on his death.

On January 16, 1947, Morrone drew up a will naming his two nephews heirs. That will was a violation of the contract between Mrs. Profit and Morrone, the suit contends.

L. Orth Sizemore, Klamath Falls attorney, was named as executor of the Morrone estate in the will and the present suit is aimed at him as well as the listed heirs. The suit seeks to have the will set aside and Teresina Profit named sole heir.
