

Pel Captain Paced Score Over Season

Zarowski Rang Up 253 Points In Taking Small Lead

Capt. Dan Zarowski, senior guard of the Pelican basketball team, led all scorers in the 35 hoop games of the Pel season just completed, putting across 253 points of the 1502 scored by the entire team. Zarowski got 101 field goals and 141 51 of 96 free throw attempts.

Pelican scoring this season was fairly evenly divided over the first string, no one player having much of a bulge over any of the others. Jack Kemnitz followed Zarowski with 250. Gary Dawes had 215 points. Bob Barnes 206 and Jack Lust 152. Kemnitz's free-throw error was the sharpest, completing 66 of 96 attempts.

In another department of the game, Dawes held away. He had 47 personal fouls called against him. Zarowski and Kemnitz each had 63.

In their 35 games, the Pels won 26 against high school competition and lost 3. Several games were played against college quintets and the overall seasonal record was 27 wins and 8 defeats for a highly satisfactory record.

STELLAR RECORD
In three years as Pelican basketball coach (1943, 1947 and 1948), Wayne Scott has compiled a variety mark of 73 wins and 8 losses against high school competition—a mark that can hardly be matched anywhere. Against collegiates his teams played eight games—six of them this past season, and won only one.

Outside of the varsity work, Scott's jayvee quintet last year won 13 games and lost 3 and this year won 18 and dropped two.

Michigan Paddlers In Front

ANN ARBOR, Mich., March 27 (AP)—With better than half the events run off, Michigan today stood out in front in the three-day NCAA swimming championships. But the defending Buckeyes from Ohio State were poised to make a dog fight of the meet.

The Wolverines placed in every one of the first six events for a 29-point total, and an 11-point lead over the Bucks.

However, Ohio State, which collected 12 points in the one meter fancy diving, is almost certain to repeat in today's high board event and make things tough for Michigan in the stretch.

Stanford, counting heavily on a 50-yard free-style victory by Bobby Anderson and a second place behind Michigan's winning 300-yard medley relay, was good for third place with 16 points.

Iowa placed in the 220, the back stroke and the relay for a 12-point total fourth place in the meet.

TIED FOR FIFTH
Yale and Michigan State ran fifth with nine points each, while Northwestern gathered six, Purdue four, Southern California three, Iowa State two and LaSalle college and North Carolina one each.

The home stretch got under way this morning with diving preliminaries. The afternoon will be devoted to time trials in the 100 and 440 free-style, the 200-yard breast stroke and the 400-yard free-style relay. Finals in the last five events will be run off tonight.

Three meet records tumbled in yesterday's competition.

In the preliminaries, George Hoogerhyde, the speedy Michigan State tanker who failed to defend his NCAA title in the 1500 meter free-style event Friday night, splashed to a 2:09.1 in the 220 race. The mark supplanted the 2:09.6 mark of Washington's Jack Medina, set in 1936.

150-YARD RECORD
Allen Stark, the stout Yale back stroker, set a mark of 1:31.8 in the 150-yard finals to eclipse the old record of 1:33.5 established in 1943 by Harry Holdway of Michigan, who swam a poor second to the Easterner last night.

The giant Michiganander came back later and led his 300 medley relay team to the third new record of this meet. Holiday, Breast Stroker Bob Sohl and Dave Tinkle, free styler, raced the distance in 2:51.9, just 1.5 seconds better than the meet record Michigan established in 1943.

RED WINGS ACQUIRE HEAVY PUCK MARGIN

DETROIT, March 27 (AP)—The Detroit Red Wings held a commanding lead today in their bid for a berth in the Stanley cup finals of the National Hockey league playoffs.

They scored their second straight win over the New York Rangers on Detroit ice 5-2 Friday night to go two-up in the best four-out-of-seven series.

The Toronto Maple Leafs, who finished first in the regular NHL season, readied themselves meanwhile for their second clash with the Boston Bruins at Toronto tonight. The Leafs won a 5-4 decision in an overtime game Wednesday night in the first clash of the two upper bracket teams.

The second place Red Wings had little difficulty in hanging up their win over the New Yorkers before a crowd of 12,553 fans at Detroit's Olympic last night.

Both clubs boarded after-midnight trains for New York and will reach the new scene of action in time to work out in the garden tonight. The third game is set for Sunday and the fourth for Tuesday, both in New York.

A fifth game, if necessary, will be played in Detroit Thursday.
