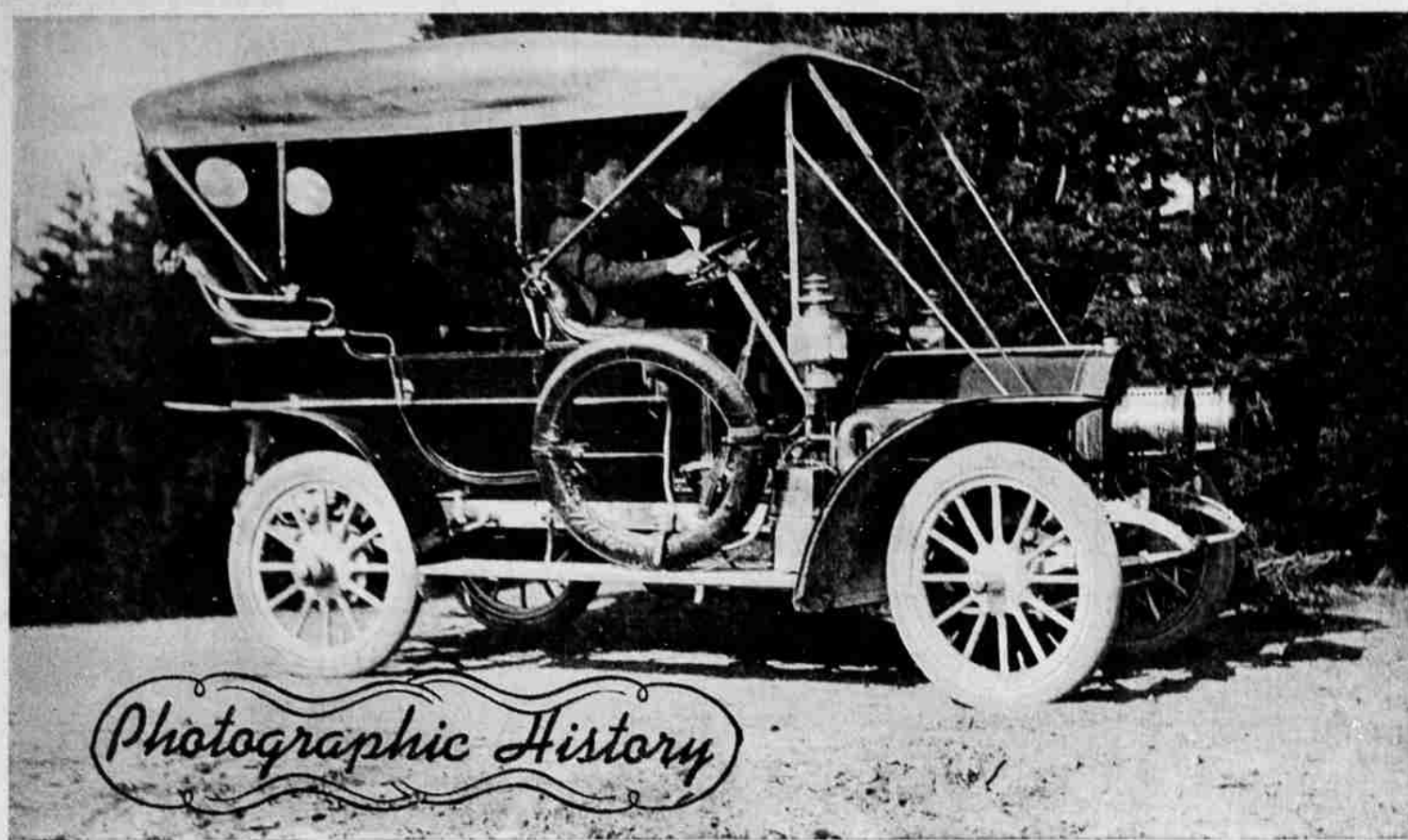




Horseless Carriage

The new horseless carriage was the marvel and the amusement of the residents of the Klamath country in the first decade of this century.

Such hardy men as Ed Dunham and Harry Peltz introduced the automobile to the area, snorting and popping along the country roads while horses shied and housewives peered cautiously from curtained windows.

Among the early automobile owners were members of the Baldwin family, whose 1910 Buick is pictured in today's Photographic History feature. Here is a view that will bring to old-timers memory of tan dusters, the smell of carbide, the instructive experience of getting-out-and-getting-under.

Driving the Buick in the picture is the late Zim Baldwin, and with him in the front seat is the late George Baldwin, long-time leading business man of the community and once a county judge.

The car would hardly be called rakish today, but it was quite the fancy machine around here in 1910.

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Tax Cutting Expensive

WASHINGTON, March 27 (AP)—Rep. Angell (R-Ore.) told the house during debate on the tax cutting bill that tax reductions generally increase government revenues.

"We have found in the past that where exceedingly high taxes are reduced the encouragement to business thereby is such that tax revenue collections are greater than before the reduction," Angell said.

"The stimulus given to business by this well merited relief to taxpayers will encourage industry generally to such an extent that we may well hope for no substantial reductions in revenue."

Angell who voted for the bill, said

inclusion of the provision for permitting the splitting of income by husband and wife was "a merited and long delayed reform" in the government's tax structure.

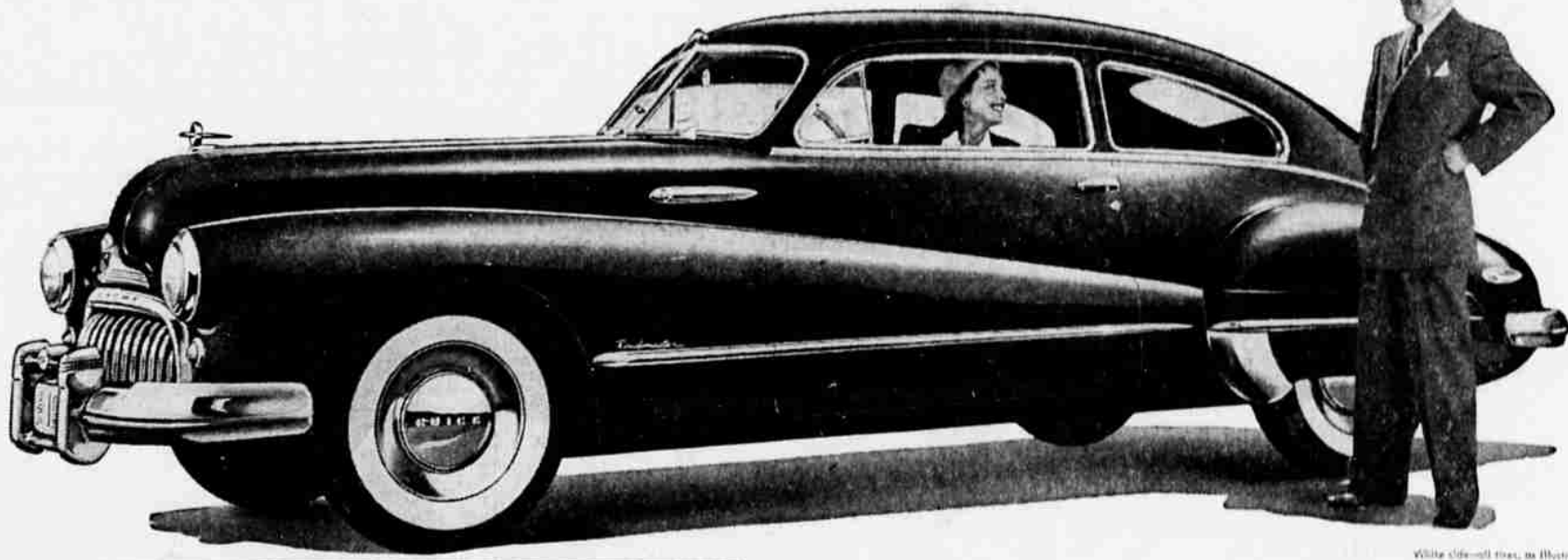

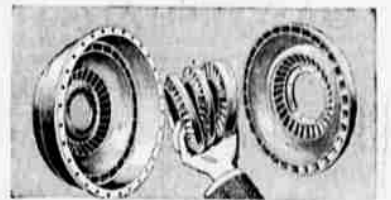
