Speaker Tells Of United Nations

"We must take the long range view of the success or failure of the United Nations," stated Dr. Edna Landros of the University of Oregon faculty, speaking before a large audience of members and visitors of the League of Women Voters at a luncheon meeting Wednesday. "Do not lose sight of the World Health Organization unit of UN, which supplied a responsible survey of food requirements for the European recovery program, which halted the spreading of the horrors of a cholera plague from Egypt, and has presented the possibilities of cancer cure from development of the atomic bomb," advised Dr. Landros.

She said that if the USSR is not restrained there is the possibility of the democratic countries of Western Europe and other powers organizing into a league with a military force, which, she added, the United Nations cannot have with Russia continuously employing the veto power.

She cited a dramatic incident of communist fifth column activity in the United States and of interference with efforts of the United Nations to provide democratic methods to all nations. This was the grounding by false weather reports of a plane carrying representatives from the United Nations to Korea. These representatives, Dr. Landros said, were to assure the Koreans of a fair election, but the plane was grounded in the United States for 72 hours, and consequently did not arrive in Korea until after the election. She gave this incident to show the power of Communism here at the present time, and the extent of its infiltration. Dr. Landros concluded with, "We may need military power to solve

the expansion craving of ambitious powers, but essentially, if we are to survive in the face of scientific advancement, we must survive as one world and that can be only under world government."

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
