A box of good things to eat sent to Holland brought a grateful "thank you" to members of Brownie troop 38 of Fairview school. The girls packed the food box in December but only recently heard from the recipient, since the package took several weeks to reach its destination.

Below are parts of the gracious reply to the Brownies from Fini Dyksen of Haarlem, Holland:

"No doubt you are wondering, nothing having heard until now of the arrival of the packet you sent me in December. The reason is that this parcel reached me a few days ago, the 12th of March. I am glad to say that everything was in good order, and I can hardly tell you how thankful I feel for this great surprise and never could have expected so many healthy and strengthening things from good friends who I never seen or heard before.

"I also send you many thanks on behalf of my parents and brother. It was awfully nice of you all. I should like to come over and thank you personally for all the kindness you have bestowed upon me and to show my gratefulness. How nice it should be to make your acquaintance, but as this is impossible for the present I take the liberty to introduce myself by writing. I am 19 years old and a pupil on the Kennemer college, where I hope to pass my final examination in the course of this year. I should love to go to America. A Dutch friend of mine is living in New Jersey near New York where she is married. It may be that I can get a shelter there for some time. Perhaps I could find a job. I don't mind what, so that I can earn my own living. But as far as I understand there will be some difficulties in getting a permit owing to the labor regulations. I hope I can find a way out.

"I need not to say that we have had a very bad time during the war but all has changed for the good. I have been separated from my parents and brother for a couple of years, but now we are all very happy being united again, and sincerely hope that we are now getting a long period of peace and rest.

"I thank you once more for all you have done for me, which I never shall forget as long as I live."
