

Old French Inn Is Setting For Play

Perhaps no more celebrated house for dark deeds existed than the sinister inn, "The Black Flamingo," on the road to Vienne le Chateau in Northern France.

Such is the background for the plot of "The Black Flamingo," Klamath Union high school student body play, to be given Thursday, April 1. Director is Mrs. B. B. Blomquist. The play will be given in the KUHS auditorium at 8 o'clock.

There will be no advance ticket sales and no reserved seats. High school students previewed the presentation at a matinee this afternoon.

At the inn, the noble emigres would halt for rest, only to awaken in the morning with their treasures gone. Often they did not awake, for sometimes the genial innkeeper and his allies found it expedient to dispose of the aristocrats altogether.

This is the setting that Sam Janney selected for his thrilling melodrama, "The Black Flamingo." In it the aristocratic De Lusacs, the colorful, Trigaud, the mysterious Cagliostro, and the flotsam and jetsam of the kingdom of thieves and murderers by a strange freak of fate are thrown together in this weird setting.

The disappearance of the Queen's necklace has been the subject of many novels and plays but none of them has wrapped this historic robbery in such mystery as Sam Janney in this production.
