Stocks Show Good Gains

NEW YORK, March 31 (AP)—Stocks engaged in a fast upward sprint today, making the ever-all market advance in March the widest for any month in more than two years.

Gains ranging to more than two points were recorded for a broad list of favorites including steels, motors, oils, non-ferrous metals, rails and chemicals.

Sharpest activity came in the first hour when the ticker tape fell briefly behind floor transactions at intervals.

A spurt in the final hour pushed total transfers around 1,700,000 shares, best in more than a week.

Truman Okays Rent Control Extension

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—President Truman Tuesday signed a bill extending rent controls for one year. He called it "better than no rent control at all."

The act, a compromise between the Senate and House, sets up an emergency federal court as final judge on the raising or removing of rent ceilings in any area.

It gives 50,000,000 Americans government rent protection until March 31, 1949.

Mr. Truman said in a statement: "If I had not signed it, rent controls would have expired tomorrow at midnight. As was true of the rent control bill of June, 1947, I had no choice but to sign."

Mr. Truman said the housing expediter "will use fully the power given him to protect tenants against illegal evictions—a power he did not have under last year's bill."

While the bill does not carry out the recommendations he made to congress "for stronger rent control," Mr. Truman said the "administration will do everything it can under this act to hold rents to reasonable levels."

Williamson also said that consideration is being given to inserting the names of those who qualified in the last drawing into the next one, with the possibility of some additional showing to bring their applications up to date.

Representatives of various veteran organizations of Southern Oregon and Northern California attended the session. No action taken there was among, but was intended to give the reclamation bureau a slant on public thinking about the homestead regulations.

Argument There was also much talk about the rule that disqualifies applicants who own land on a reclamation project on which construction charges have not been paid in full. Williamson said that late in the last opening, a clarification was obtained which would exempt such land which is strictly a home site rather than a farm. This would permit owners of small tracts in the suburban areas, which are in the Enterprise irrigation district, to qualify for farms, even though the district's construction charges are not paid.

Williamson said that further clarification of the construction charge ruling is being sought.

New Rule Eyed Williamson indicated that at the next drawing, the actual drawing would be held prior to the final qualification of applicants. All applicants whose applications are mechanically complete would participate in the drawing. After the drawing, the examining board would make a thorough check of those whose names were drawn, with a personal interview of all of them.

This would save the examining board the huge job of making a pre-drawing examination of all applications as has been done in the past.
