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## Tillotson Honored By Dinner Party

Mitchell Tillotson, who is going up as a vice president of a major division of one of the world's largest banking institutions, was honored by 50 of his friends at a warm-hearted farewell gathering in the Pelican party room Tuesday night. The affair was sponsored by the chamber of commerce, of which Tillotson had been a director and president. Tillotson has been with the First National bank here for 14 years, most of them as manager of the bank which is a branch of the First National of Portland. He is moving to Portland as vice president of the First National, which is affiliated with the Giannini interests.

Andrew M. Collier presided at the farewell dinner. He recalled that Tillotson came west to Paisley for his health in 1921, moved into Lakeview as a deputy sheriff and later as bank cashier, operated a newspaper in Alturas, headed a banking operation there, and then moved to Klamath Falls at the request of the late J. A. Gordon, long-time president of the First National here.

Several others present gave amusing recollections of incidents in which Tillotson had a part, especially camping and hunting trips. The guest of honor spoke at length about his experiences in Lake, Modoc and Klamath counties—which he described as "all the same country" where living is just a bit different than anywhere else.

Discussing Klamath relations with Portland, Tillotson said that both communities may benefit from greater friendship, and he hopes to make at least a small contribution to that cause.

Harlan Bosworth, formerly of Klamath Falls and now living at Medford, came here for the affair and was one of the speakers.
