

Mob Storms Home Of Communist

COLUMBUS, O., March 31 (AP)—Two weeks of heckling by stones and telephone calls were climaxed last night by the storming of the home of a self-proclaimed communist leader.

A crowd of 300 watched and cheered 30 or 40 persons who broke into the southside house occupied by Frank Hashmall, 26-year-old former New York college student. He, his wife and child were absent.

Before police came to read the riot act, the gang broke all the windows and much of the furniture, but left untouched four bookcases filled with communist and other literature.

Sheriff Ralph Paul announced he planned to see if Hashmall, who calls himself executive secretary of Franklin county (Columbus) communists, could be declared a public menace and forced to leave town.

Hashmall refused to talk to reporters about the incident.

He came here two weeks ago and announced his position in public statements. Newspapers smoked out his telephone number, but one paper published it with the wrong exchange. The owner of that telephone complained it was ringing all the time and every time he answered he got abuse.

Hashmall and a small group of followers attempted to pass out communist literature at the Timken Roller Bearing company last week. Timken workers tore up the pamphlets. Police prevented violence.

Truman Asks "American" Show

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—President Truman Tuesday asked for widespread observance of Sunday, May 16, at "I Am an American Day."

He said in a proclamation that foreign and domestic problems facing the nation "require unselfish devotion and united effort on the part of all our citizens."

"Loyalty to a great ideal has brought together people of every race, creed, and culture—all blended into a unity which has been the strength of our country and has enabled it to meet every crisis," he added.

Power Rate Boost Gets Okay

SALEM, March 31 (AP)—Public Utilities Commissioner John H. Carlin today authorized the Utah Electric company to increase its rates \$1 per month for each of its 80 customers.

The company is located in Ukiah, Southern Umatilla county. A majority of the company's customers asked for the rate increase to offset increased oil prices. The company does not make a profit.

The company's secretary-treasurer gets a salary of \$25 a month, and its maintenance man-operator gets \$15 a month.

Southern Pacific Places Order For Freight Cars

Southern Pacific is placing orders now for 8500 new freight train cars, the orders covering a major portion of the 9830 freight cars the company recently announced were included in its 1948 program for new rolling stock.

This was reported to SP offices here by A. T. Mercier, president of the railroad, who pointed out that the new orders will raise to 19,250 the number of freight train cars Southern Pacific has ordered since the end of the war. Of 10,150 freight cars on previous postwar orders, 7251 had been delivered by the end of February, and it was expected all freight cars on these earlier orders would be in service by the end of July.

Chinese Flee Chahar Area

PEIPING, March 31 (AP)—Chinese communist troops streamed out of Southern Chahar province, Inner Mongolia, Tuesday, under air attack, government reports said.

The main communist force, the dispatches added, already has crossed the Sankan river in a march toward hill bases in Hopeh province west of the Peiping-Paoing railway. The withdrawal followed a government counteroffensive.

The Catholic newspaper, Social Welfare, reported many communist soldiers conscripted in Southern Chahar surrendered with their arms. It said the communist campaign there had ended but that guerrilla bands remained active.

Dispatches said government troops from Tatung, 150 miles west of Peiping and Peuchien, Northern Shansi railroad, had joined, further easing the situation around Tatung. Earlier, a plane was chartered to evacuate 25 missionaries from Tatung. Peiping sources predicted a big battle there within a few days.

National planes spotted several thousand reds moving southward from the railway between Tatung and Kalgan, 116 miles northwest of Peiping.

OVS, March 31 — The Disabled American Veterans' auxiliary has contributed \$25 to Oregon Vocational school.

The contribution has been added to the OVS student loan fund and was presented to the school by Mrs. R. W. Lowry, commander, and Inez Skeen, treasurer.

Estate Tops \$25,000 Mark

Value of the estate of the late Sheldon Brumbaugh, Klamath Falls architect, is estimated but said to be in excess of \$25,000 in Klamath and Curry counties, according to probate filings here. The maximum filing fee was paid, indicating value over \$25,000.

Brumbaugh died of a heart attack March 23 while trying to get his car through a snowdrift near his home at Pine Grove. He was 44 years old.

A will dated May 17, 1946, bequeathed Brumbaugh's architectural library to Wallace J. Alexander of Sacramento, engineer for Brumbaugh's firm, gave \$1000 in cash to two daughters, Ann and Katherine of Oregon City and left the remainder of his property to his wife—Catherine.

Mrs. Brumbaugh was named executrix of the will.

Alexander was with Brumbaugh at the time of his sudden death.

TVA Power Up Plan Asked

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—President Truman today directed the Tennessee valley authority to draw up plans for increasing the power output for emergency needs.

He instructed TVA Chairman Gordon R. Clapp to draft a program looking toward a vast new supply of electricity for aluminum, chemical and other defense plants.

Chairman Edwin G. Nourse of the president's council of economic advisers and Chairman Arthur M. Hill of the national security resources board sat in with Clapp at a White House conference.

Nourse said Mr. Truman was "deeply concerned" that there be an adequate power program to supply the needs for electricity.

Aluminum, the vital necessity for the plane building program, uses a vast amount of electricity.

Queen Wilhelmina Still Very Ill

THE HAGUE, The Netherlands, March 31 (AP)—Queen Wilhelmina still is unable to resume her activities fully and has been advised by her physicians to extend her rest, her secretary announced today.

The 67-year-old queen has restricted her activities recently to the most urgent state affairs. The monarch relinquished her power for six weeks late last year when her daughter, Crown Princess Juliana, served as regent. Wilhelmina resumed royal power in December.

De Soto Joins SF School Staff

SAN FRANCISCO—Alex De Soto, formerly with the staff of the Seattle Star and more recently an instructor at Klamath Union high school, has joined the instructing staff of the college of business administration of the University of San Francisco.

De Soto's appointment was announced by Roy C. Hall, dean of the college. He will head classes in business English and letter writing during the university's summer session, and continue full time at the start of the fall semester.

Call Out For Alaska Teachers

JUNEAU, Alaska, March 31 (AP)—Can you teach? Are you married? Want an adventure?

If you can answer all three questions with a "yes," then look up Dr. George A. Dale, director of education for the Alaska Native service.

He issued his annual call for teachers today with 25 openings for married teachers. The posts are Indian, Eskimo and Aleut schools from Point Barrow to Southeastern Alaska and west to the tip of the Alaska peninsula.

Both man and wife will be given jobs even if only one can teach. The teacher draws \$2740 and the spouse \$1350 as assistant. Both receive 26 days annual leave and transportation to and from Seattle.
