SOME GRAINS SHOW GAINS

CHICAGO, April 1 (AP)—Grains made fair-sized gains on the board of trade today, Wheat led the advance when the government asked for offers of flour for export. A good demand in the cash trade helped corn.

The production and marketing administration asked mills to submit flour offers within one hour after the market closes. Shipments will be to the Gulf of Mexico in April.

Wheat closed 3 to 3 1/2 higher, May \$2.44 1/2-1/4, corn was 3 1/2-3 1/4 higher, May \$2.21-22 1/4, oats were 1 1/4-3/4 higher, May \$1.12 1/2-1/4, and soybeans were 5 to 7 cents higher, May \$3.75-\$3.74.

Stocks Still On Upgrade

NEW YORK, April 1 (AP)—The lengthy stock market recovery inspired heavy profit cashing today but this was absorbed in fairly good shape.

Early losses running to a point or more subsequently were reduced or converted into plus signs. Mild irregularity ruled near the close.

Volume of around 1,500,000 shares compared with 1,780,000 yesterday. On the downside the greater part of the day were U. S. Rubber, Goodrich, Boeing, Douglas Aircraft, American Can, Johns-Manville, Pacific Western Oil and Paramount Pictures.

Texas Pacific Coal & Oil touched a high for the year. Ahead were Union Pacific, Great Northern Railway, U. S. Steel, General Motors, Sears Roebuck, Kennecott, and Warner Bros.

Principal buying incentives again stemmed from the prospects of big government spending on rearmament and European relief in addition to hopes for tax reduction. A possible settlement of the coal mining walkout bolstered sentiment.

Bonds steadied. Commodities strengthened. Cotton, toward the finish, was up \$1.15 to \$2.05 a bale. At Chicago wheat ended up 3 to 3 1/2 cents a bushel, corn 3/4 to 5/8 and oats 1/4 to 3/8.

Kiwanis Park Plans Ahead of Schedule

Work on the five-year plan for Kiwanis park in Mills addition is ahead of schedule, members of the park planning committee advised today.

In March, 1947, the city park project was decided upon by the Kiwanis club, city council approval was obtained on April 11 and work started about mid-April. The park site is bounded by Applegate, Division, Mitchell and Reclamation streets.

Land was leveled and scraped, the plumbing system with under-sprinkling was put in, loads of top soil hauled and spread, the ground seeded to grass, and trees planted.

Playground equipment has been ordered and the park will be ready for use this year. There will be a battery of swings and see-saws and slides for small children. A soft-ball diamond is planned, basketball and volleyball courts, platted for summer recreation of children living in the Mills area.

The turf is coming along fine and 46 trees have been planted in the parking between the curbing and sidewalks surrounding the park on all sides. The trees are attractive species of maple, birch, hawthorne, American elm and others.

Kiwanians have placed 155 sun ball machines in business houses about the city and plan to have 225 in all, with the pennies from the machines paying for the park equipment.
