C Of C Eyes Director Limitation

Directors of the chamber of commerce voted Wednesday to put before the membership a by-law change which would limit directorships to two consecutive terms.

At present, no member may serve more than three two-year terms without dropping out at least one year.

Board members said in the discussion they feel that even shorter tenure should be decreed, so that new blood will be forced into the board at regular intervals.

Managers Charles Stark reported that the Lions club has taken the lead in the civic organization's membership drive.

The chamber's highway program for primary and secondary roads, to be presented to the state highway interim committee coming here April 12, was given final approval.

The board voted to pass on to the next board, which takes office May 1, the matter of attempting to bring about consolidation of more organization financing drives.

Board members plan to have their luncheon on April 14 at Fort Klamath with members of the Oregon Advertising club who will be on a tour of the state.

Plans for the tourist host school to be held here in April were approved.

Two big cats, one D-7 and the other a D-8, were working in the Lake of the Woods area this week clearing the Klamath county road of snow.

The county sent the two big cats toward Lake of the Woods last Sunday and drivers were able to make it to the top of the hill. It is understood that the east side road will be cleared to the end of the Klamath line.

If it isn't snow it's the thaw that gives state highway employees a headache, and right now officials say the ache is plenty severe.

Major job now is concentrating on the spring break-up of pavement on highways leading out of this area. Especially bad is the section between mileposts 236 and 239, highway 97, in the vicinity of Sand creek.

Highway engineers explained that water seeps up in the afternoon and goes down at night and creates a damaging condition to the roadbed. In some places it has been found necessary to blast, replace with solid rock and re-oil the surface.

Fast melting snows with frost still in the ground is the reason for the break-up at this time of the year.

Suggestion for a Klamath Falls air show and fair came today from City Airport Manager W. B. Whitcomb and Mayor, Ed Ostendorf.

Whitcomb said that plenty of space is available at the big field for a large number of exhibits.

Mayor Ostendorf explained that the plan will be a sort of open house to better acquaint people with the city airfield, formerly the naval air station, which the city recently took over.

Cripple Tells Of Slaying
SEATTLE, April 1 (AP)—A 28-year-old cripple confessed last night, detectives said, that he robbed and killed his former employer, Ray Arnold, 63, a service station operator.

Detective Sgt. Foster A. Heslop and Detective Don Sprinkle said the oral statement was made by Ralph Shelton shortly after he talked with a minister in his cell. Shelton had been discharged from his job, the officers reported.

In his statement Shelton was quoted as saying he duped Arnold into driving him to a hill above Boeing plant No. 1 by saying his car was there.

"I was riding in the back seat," the statement said, "and after I told him to stop, I struck him on the head with a hammer."

"I didn't want to hit him hard enough to kill him. After I struck him, he shoved open the driver's door and started to get out."

Plane Crash Kills Pilot
ROCKAWAY, Ore., April 1 (AP)—A navy Helidiver plummeted to earth on a coast mountain east of here yesterday, killing the pilot soon after the plane left the Tillamook naval air base.

Loggers witnessed the plane's troubled flight, saw it fall and were the first to reach the scene. They said it appeared to have struck in a dive.

Navy officials at 13th district headquarters in Seattle withheld the name of the pilot pending notification of next of kin.

Claim To Moon Brought Too Soon
WASHINGTON, April 1 (AP)—The government today turned down two Pennsylvanians who laid claim to the moon.

Secretary of the Interior Krug, saying the moon belongs to everyone, denied their request that the government approve the claim.

Bids Called On Four Big Turbines
PORTLAND, April 1 (AP)—Bids for designing, manufacture and delivery of four 110,000 horsepower electric turbines for McNary dam on the Columbia river were called today by the army engineers.

The units are to be the first of 14 to be installed in the dam, third largest on the river. Bids will be opened May 14.

\$50 Fine Given For Disorderly
Rufus Jenkins, negro porter employed by the Southern Pacific, was fined \$50 and given a five-month suspended sentence after he entered a plea of guilty in Justice J. A. Mahoney's court Wednesday on a charge of disorderly conduct.

Jenkins, now on probation under court orders, is said to have threatened the SP station master at Crescent Lake.

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Soviets Free US Marines In China

SHANGHAI, April 1 (AP)—Four U. S. marines captured by the Chinese communists while on a Christmas day hunting trip in North China were released today.

U. S. navy authorities reported the leathernecks were released at Haiyang, a coastal city 60 miles northeast of U. S. Western Pacific Fleet headquarters at Tsingtao.

Officials said they presumed the four are in good condition. Efforts are being made to recover the body of a fifth, Pfc. Charles J. Brayton Jr., Fort Jay, Governor's Island, N. Y., who died of wounds received in the incident.

The four were Cpl. William L. Pellard, Fort Worth, Tex., Pfc. Carol W. Dickerson, Olathe, Kas.; Pvt. Robert Hart, Pittsburgh, Pa.; and Pfc. Thomas Kapodistria, Buffalo, N. Y.

Account Muddled
There has been no clear account of what happened Christmas morning near the village of Wangtan Yuen, where the five were captured. Marine authorities reported the five entered communist territory over the protest of Chinese national guards at Linchuan.

Trailer Death Said Suicide
PORTLAND, April 1 (AP)—The fatal burning of a 53-year-old woman in her trailer home was listed by officials as a suicide today, after a newspaper received a letter from the victim.

The Oregonian published the letter, written to a staff feature writer and mailed over the week-end, in which Mrs. Mae Barton wrote she was "on a merry-go-round—getting nowhere."

She explained that she no longer was attractive—"hunger can do strange things to a person"—and was lonely and feared illness. "I can not find a way out," she added.

Fire gutted her dingy trailer house early Sunday. Neighbors awakened by her screams, took her from the flaming trailer. She died seven hours later.
