The new flared skirts, so prominent in this spring's fashions, require special care in making at home if they are to hang well and avoid rags and puckers, says Lucy Lane, clothing specialist from Oregon State college, who recently conducted a dress workshop in Klamath Falls. Because the gores of flared skirts are cut almost on the bias, the cut edge easily stretches out of shape and that spoils the hang and fit of the skirt.

Avoiding that stretch is necessary throughout the process of making. One rule to remember is to work from the bottom up to save pull on the fabric. Press seams open, and in pressing, take care not to pull or stretch. Instead of pushing the iron up and down, pat the seam with it, and lift it from place to place.

Finish the skirt all but the hem and then hang it up a couple of days to let it take on its normal shape before marking the hem. If the skirt is very full, the hem should be no deeper than 2 inches to prevent bulkiness.

Cops Delay Auto Trip

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 1 (AP)—Phil Baker, 24-year-old infantile paralysis victim whose friends reported him missing last week, reappeared Wednesday—safe, but a little tired of policemen.

Baker disappeared last week, just after getting a specially-equipped car. Veterans organizations and others had given Baker—a veteran who cannot use his legs because of polio—the down payment on the car.

He turned up today and said he hadn't been missing; just driving to Everett to collect his high school diploma to submit for college credentials. The trip was slow, he explained, because every few miles a state patrolman—all of whom had been alerted to watch for him—kept stopping him.

Safecracker Must Pay Up

NEW YORK, April 1 (AP)—In addition to paying his debt to society by serving time in prison, a safecracker must pay an insurance company for damage he did to a vault and safe, a state supreme court jury ruled yesterday.

The amount is \$812—including interest—and it will be easy for the convict, 33-year-old Stanley Patrick, to pay. He has \$15,000 in bank accounts, Justice James B. M. McNally noted.

Patrick, who pleaded his own case, contended he was not liable to pay the Aetna Casualty and Security company which insured the safe, because he was acquitted of the specific charge of burglary when he was convicted of grand larceny.
