GRAINS SHOW FIRM TREND

CHICAGO, April 2 (AP)—A firm trend in wheat and easier undertone in corn featured dealing in grains today. Price changes were small in all pits.

Firmness in wheat was traced to belief the government had bought fairly large supplies of flour overnight. But best gains were not held when it became known the government did not want cash wheat at current prices.

Wheat ended 1/4 cent lower to 1/2 cent higher. May \$2.43 1/2-\$2.44, corn was 2 to 3 cents lower, May \$2.18 1/2-\$2.19, oats were 1/4 cent lower, May \$1.11 1/2-\$1.12, and soybeans were unchanged to a cent higher, May \$3.74.

Salable sheep 1500, total 1500; opening sales and bids 25 cents higher; load just-good around 105 pound fed woolled western 22.00; good and choice around 95-105 pound weights bid at 22.50; other classes very scarce; few cull to good shorn slaughter ewes steady at 8.00-10.00.

Slowdowns were frequent after a fairly active start. Initial declines of fractions to a point or so were trimmed or converted into gains near the close. Transfers for the full proceedings tapered to around 1,000,000 shares.

Resistant were General Motors, Chrysler, Woolworth, Republic Steel, U. S. Rubber, American Woolen, and United Air Lines.

Stragglers most of the day were Bethlehem Steel, North American, U. S. Gypsum, Philip Morris, Allied Chemical, Chesapeake & Ohio and Paramount Pictures.

Bonds were narrow. Major commodities suffered a late reaction. Cotton, toward the finish, was up 75 cents a bale to off as much. At Chicago wheat ended off 1/4 to 1/2 cent and oats off 1/4 to 1/2 cent.
