The scrap drive being conducted by the teen-agers will continue for several days, and will begin this Saturday in Merrill and Tulelake. Proceeds from the drive will help finance the center's program.

The Teen-Age center's radio broadcast on radio station KFJI each Saturday evening will be handled this week by Sacred Heart academy students. Time of the broadcast will be announced early Saturday.

Volume Up... Profit Down

SAN JOSE, Calif., April 2 (AP)—Food Machinery Corp. Thursday reported sales volume of \$77,170,469 in 1947, largest for any peacetime year in the firm's history. The showing resulted largely from the fact that production was less hampered by shortage of critical materials.

Net income for the year was \$6,164,526, equal to \$4.48 per share of common stock. Net in 1946 was \$4,298,342 or \$6.42 per share of common, with half as much stock outstanding.

Paul L. Davies, president, reported that although the sales volume was unprecedented, the margin of profit was substantially lower than in previous years due to higher costs. He cited an increase of 91.3 per cent in the average wage for hourly workers and an advance of about 68 per cent in costs of materials.

The firm has a branch at Yakima, Wash.

Police Hold Theft Suspects

SEATTLE, April 2 (AP)—A police roundup Wednesday night and early Thursday netted seven persons for questioning in connection with a series of Seattle and Portland robberies.

The six men and a woman were arrested in widely scattered raids in hotels and apartments.

The arrests followed a tip from Portland police. Detective Sgt. L. A. O'Mera ordered the full homicide and robbery force into the dragnet operation which led to the arrests.

The room of one of the arrested men yielded three pistols and a paper sack filled with half dollars, quarters, dimes and nickels.

Police said two of the arrested men admitted robbing a Portland night club of \$1000 before coming to Seattle yesterday.

All were held this forenoon without charge.

O'Mera said all members of the group were being questioned about the March 21 robbery here of the Sander Fountain Lunch office by a gang which tied up Mr. and Mrs. Edward Sander in their home while robbing their office safe.

Bieri Heads Naval District

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—Vice Admiral Bernard H. Bieri, of Wells, Minn., has been named commander of the 11th naval district with headquarters at San Diego, the navy said Thursday.

He succeeds Rear Adm. Oscar Badger, who recently was given command of the Western Pacific fleet.

Bieri recently returned from the Mediterranean where he commanded U. S. naval forces.

The navy also announced changes of duty for four other flag officers. Rear Admiral Benjamin J. Rodgers, of Pittsburgh, Pa., has been given command of Pacific fleet amphibious forces with headquarters at Pearl Harbor.

He relieves Rear Admiral Arthur D. Struble, who was recently named deputy chief of naval operations for operations.

Rear Admiral Peter K. Fischer, of Wellsboro, Pa., commander, amphibious training command, will take over Admiral Rodgers' old job.

Rear Admiral Robert F. Hickey, of Red Bluff and Yreka, Calif., deputy director of public relations, will command fleet air wing five, based at Norfolk, Va.

Father Sues In Son's Death Case
SPOKANE, April 2 (AP)—An \$11,000.00 damage suit against the government as a result of the death of four-year-old Fredric George Beach in Nome, Alaska, is scheduled for trial in federal court Monday.

The plaintiff is Herbert G. Beach, the boy's father. He alleged in his complaint that the child was killed May 2, 1945, because of the negligence of an army truck driver. The boy was run over on the main street of Nome.

The father asked \$10,000 general damages and \$1,000.00 for funeral and transportation expenses.

Long Estate Goes To Son

Probate filings of the estate of the late E. R. (Pat) Long, who died March 26, made no estimate of the value of the estate except that it is in excess of \$25,000 and the bulk of the property goes to Long's son, Murel.

The prominent Klamath county rancher left a will dated March 2, 1947, with A. W. Schaupp, attorney, in which he named Murel A. Long, executor of the estate.

The will provided that the widow, Mrs. Janice Long, be given the family home at 1545 Eldorado in lieu of dower and other claims and that the son be given the remainder of the estate. That includes the Long ranch holdings on Lower Klamath lake which the father and son recently purchased and incorporated.

Education Bill Up To House
WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—Whether the government will give \$300,000,000 in federal school aid to the states next year depends on the house.

The senate approved such a measure late yesterday, 58 to 22, after a week's debate.

But there were no plans in the house for immediate consideration of the bill which senate supporters have hailed as providing an added weapon in the war of words against communism.

An education aid bill somewhat similar to the senate's was approved nearly a year ago by a house public welfare subcommittee. But the full committee has never acted on it.

Rent Rulings Outlined

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—Housing Expediter T. C. Woods today laid down new requirements for local rent advisory boards.

Under the one-year control extension which went into effect Wednesday, congress said these boards shall "consist of not less than five members who are citizens of the area and who, insofar as practicable, as a group are representative of the affected interests in the area."

Woods said a five-man board, to be "representative," must have one landlord member, one tenant member and three public interest members. Where the boards are larger, the same ratio must be followed.

Under the old law which created the local boards last year, there was no specific requirement as to the proportionate representation.

Governors of the various states appoint the local board members. These serve without pay except for travel expenses and a \$10 daily allowance when away from their home cities on board business.

All members of present boards in the 600 rental areas were requested by Woods to continue serving pending a survey to check on their representation.

Food Convoy Hit By Arabs

JERUSALEM, April 2 (AP)—A Jerusalem-bound Jewish food convoy reportedly tried today to blast through fierce Arab gunfire in the Judean hills.

Early, scant reports said, it was thrown back with loss of life on both sides.

The convoy, trying to get food to the beleaguered Holy City, has been stalled by Arab guns for two days only 15 miles from Jerusalem's gates. Arabs have dug in on the Judean hills commanding approaches of the Tel-Aviv-Jerusalem road.

Jewish sources reported 17 Jews and some 30 Arabs were killed in the convoy's first effort Wednesday to crash through to Jerusalem's hungry Jews.

Originally 75 trucks rolled toward Jerusalem. Five armored cars were lost in the first skirmish, but ten reportedly squeezed through.

There was only sporadic gunfire reported elsewhere in Palestine today.

Last night the British dropped mortar shells into the Montefiore district of Jerusalem in an effort to break up a bloody fight between Jews and Arabs. Montefiore is a Jewish quarter.
