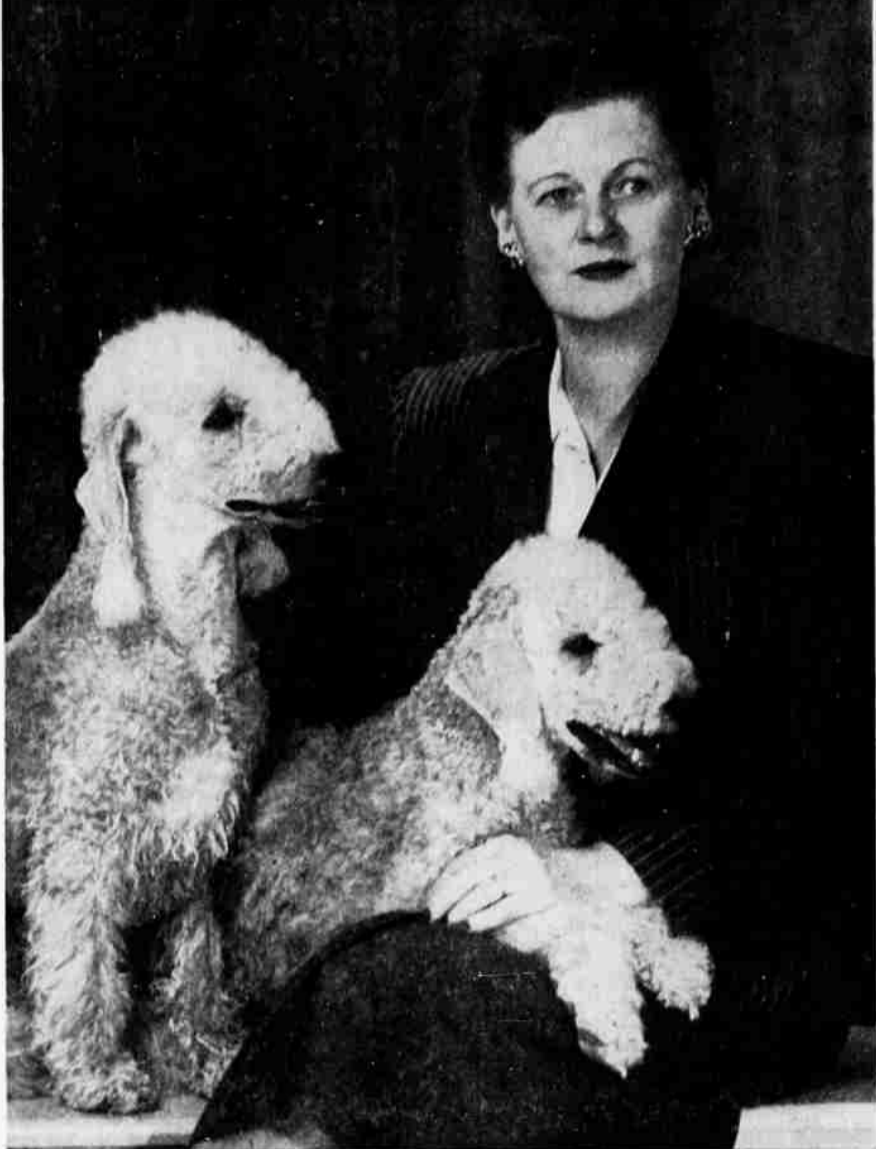
A movie and later, birthday luncheon at the Pelican cafe were the order of the day.
