At this time each member was presented with her program book for the year, which had been planned by a committee at an earlier date. One of the most attractive features of the book this year is the quotations and bits of verse gathered by the committee members from various books and magazines, which head the pages of each meeting date.

The tea is being given for the benefit of one of the national charity organizations. It also sponsors a 4-H garden club.

As the club has no special money-making projects, it last year took up taking subscriptions to all popular magazines as a means of keeping some small sums coming in to take care of current expenses. Special projects for this year include a 15-minute discussion at each meeting on home landscaping. A contest will be held at each meeting for various displays, with three ribbons given for prizes. At the end of the year prizes will be given to the holders of the most ribbons.

The next meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. Virginia Toffle on April 16. The date has been set forward because the district meeting falls on the regular date. The roll call will be, "If you were limited to growing one flower, what would it be and why?" The contest will be a specimen of forced flowering branches. The topic, "Making the soil, makes the garden," with a talk on fertilizers and compost making by Irene Hartley.

PULLMAN, Wash., April 2 (AP)—The "honor roll" of Washington cowboys with lifetime butterfat production records of 3000 pounds or more is getting bigger.

M. B. Nichols, extension dairyman at Washington State college, said 174 such cows were listed during the 1947 test year. The total on Dairy Herd Improvement association records now is 848.

The champion living lifetime producer in the state, Nichols said, is Cuckanut Bonny Jean, a registered Guernsey owned by Friedrich Bros. of Bow. She produced 7787 pounds of butterfat during 12 lactation periods.
