Two Pins Are Difference In Leading Marks

Flo Ann Eaton, left-handed ace of women bowlers in Klamath Falls, last night added to her list of bowling accomplishments the all-events championship of the city women's association tournament. She edged Dena Backes by two pins for the top tourney crown.

Flo Ann's total score for the nine games was 1548, and all from scratch since she was recorded a zero handicap for the city tourney. She had 538 in team rolling, 480 in doubles and 530 in singles. Her singles line included a 224 game, best of the two-day meet.

Dena Backes placed second in all-events at 1548, combining team score of 521, doubles of 506 and singles of 523. Lyle Smith came in third, 1520, and Agnes Geddes, 1457.

FIRST DEADLOCK
Singles efforts were divided into three classifications, A, B and C, with Flo Ann Eaton and Barbara Peterson deadlocking for first place in class A with 530. The latter was aided by a 33-pin handicap. Bernice Britt placed third at 528.

Class B singles went to Dena Backes, 525, followed by Goldie Anderson's 498, Ruby Phelps' 477 and Beth Griggs' 472.

In class C Jeannette Overeem took down first prize with a combined 513, Clara Bold had 511, Lyle Smith 506 and Opal McDonald 494.

The doubles and singles were accomplished in about eight hours of solid rolling yesterday at Recreation alleys. The girls started at 4 p. m. and were just marking up the last frame at midnight.

SALEM HI WINS HILL RELAY RUN

PORTLAND, April 3 (AP)—Oregon schools won the titles in the annual Hill Military academy relay here last night, but a Washington school turned in the most sparkling performance.

Salem won in class A, Hood River in class B and St. Lawrence in class C. Mt. Vernon, Wash., high came up with the meet's feature, however, by winning the class B distance medley in a record 6:48 minutes—16.6 seconds under the old mark, established by Bend, Ore., in 1940.

The Mt. Vernon runners, Dennis Danielson, Melvin Pederson, Glen Kellstrom and Arnold Morris, traveled three-quarters of a mile, a half-mile, a quarter-mile and 200 yards in their stint.

Dick Speth, Washington State, successfully defended the Cunningham mile title he won last year, although the time was slow—4:39.1 minutes. Jim Newcomb, Portland, high school youth, was second.

The Gallup Poll Fans Agree Louis Will Beat Jersey Joe In June

Director, American Institute of Public Opinion
PRINCETON, N. J., April 3—In a close split decision American sports fans give the world heavyweight title in his return bout with Joe Walcott next June.

The men and women who regularly follow sports think in the ratio of 4 to 3 that the champion will win.

But no such mixed opinions prevail among the nation's ace forecasters, the sports editors of daily newspapers. A representative sampling of leading dailies finds the editors almost unanimously predicting a Joe Louis victory.

Field reporters for the American Institute of Public Opinion asked thousands of representative men and women throughout the country if they followed sports. Those who said they did were then asked:

"Do you think Joe Louis can beat Jersey Joe Walcott when and if they fight again next summer?"

Yes, Joe Louis will win 49%
No, Joe Walcott will win 36%
Don't know who will win 13%
If they had to place bets on the outcome, more men than women would put their money on the champion.

Bill Lucas of the Tucson, Arizona, Daily Citizen, put the majority view very simply: "Remember the second Schmeling fight?"

On the Walcott side of the ring, the Cleveland, Ohio, Plain Dealer's Gordon Cobblecick had this to say: "Once they lose what Louis apparently has lost on the basis of his December fight with Walcott, they never get it back. Walcott is old but hungry. Louis is old but surfeited with soft living. You can't beat it."

Agency Is Chary Of Flyway Hunting Law

WASHINGTON, April 3 (AP)—Duck hunters received notice today the government will move slowly on any proposal to regulate shooting by flyways rather than by zones.

Full hunting seasons now are established according to well-defined zones throughout the United States.

Many sportsmen contend that uniform regulations along flyways—the regular southbound migratory routes—would be more fair.

There are four flyways: Atlantic, Mississippi, Rocky Mountain and Pacific.

But Secretary of the Interior Krug last night told Ducks Unlimited, famous sportsmen's organization, the flyway plan is "such a new concept we must go a little slow in applying it."

Louis Named In Suit Involving N.Y. Model

CHICAGO, April 3 (AP)—A negro minister asks \$500,000 damages from Joe Louis, heavyweight boxing champion, for allegedly stealing the love of his wife, a New York model.

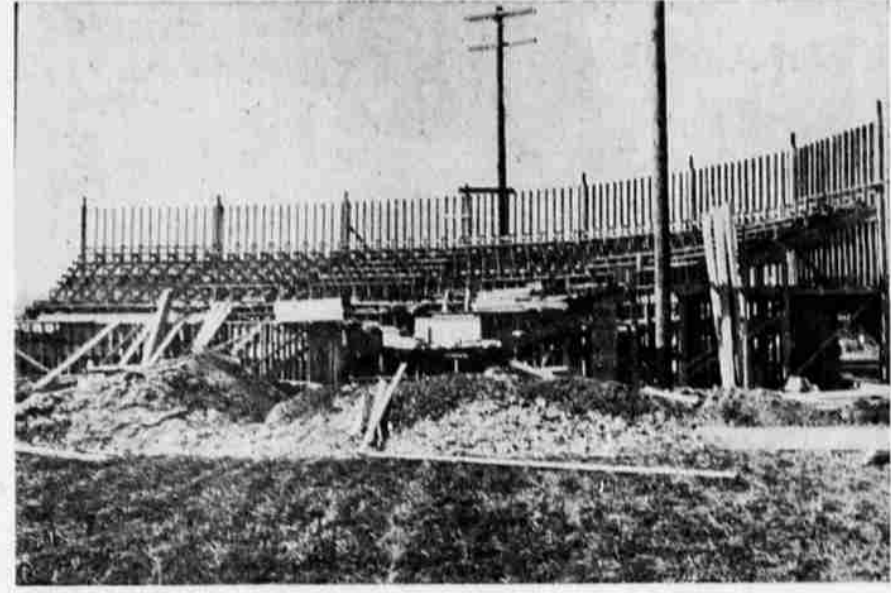
An alienation of affections suit against Louis, 33, and filed yesterday for nearly 11 years, was titled yesterday by the Rev. Matthew C. Faulkner, 32-year-old Baptist minister of Atlanta, Ga.

Louis, married since 1935 and father of two children, is in Paris. He is accompanied by his wife, the former Marva Trotter of Chicago.

The suit alleged that Louis, during November, December and January, "by subterfuge, connivance and design, maliciously" won the affections of Faulkner's wife, Mattie Carrie Faulkner.

Mrs. Faulkner, who is described in the suit as "a beautiful woman," said in New York she is 23 and is employed as a model under her professional name of Carol Drake.

Ritchie Batters Seraphs

SAN DIEGO, April 3 (AP)—John Ritchey is doing all right for himself, and the San Diego Padres, as the first negro player in the Pacific coast league.

He fired the loudest blast of the big game, a three-run homer, when San Diego trounced the Los Angeles Angels, 7-3, last night. It was the only game in the league, the others having been rained out.

The Angels took a 1-0 lead in the fourth inning on Mickey Burnett's homer but San Diego fixed that in the same inning by scoring twice. Ritchey drove in the second run with a single. Los Angeles tied at 2-2 in the fifth but in their half the Padres drove Angel starting pitcher, Russ Bauers from the mound.

Bauers gave three walks and a single which with an error, produced two Padres runs and left two men on base. Ritchey cleared the bases with his homer over the right field fence immediately after Bill Fien's lead-off home run. The Angels' Bill Schuster homered in the eighth. San Diego's Pefty Al Olson held Los Angeles to six hits, the Padres collecting 10.

Ritchey, a former San Diego high school student, is a catcher who, since the PCL season opened Tuesday has had a homer, a triple and two singles in seven times at bat and has drawn three walks.

The San Diego-Los Angeles series is now even at two games apiece.

Boxer's Kin Given \$4000

HOLLYWOOD, April 3 (AP)—The family of LeRoy De Catur, 20, negro lightweight boxer who died in the ring Feb. 27, is slated to receive a check for more than \$4,000 today.

It was coming from the Hollywood Legion stadium, whose officials said that was the amount raised by a benefit show last night. It was in the Legion ring that De Catur collapsed and died of acute dilatation of the heart.

All proceeds were to go to the boxer's widow and infant son. In the feature six-round, Rudy Davila, 150½, dethroned Mike Angustain, 157½.

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
