Pay Up For Fir Workers Held Certain

A \$1.45 an hour minimum for the Oregon and Washington fir industry today appears likely of ratification following week-end negotiations between employers and International Woodworkers of America (IWO) and a similar pay boost of 12 1/2 cents an hour may be in the making for pine industry workers.

CIO officials and the Pine Industrial Relations committee will meet here Tuesday morning at the PIRC office for further talks.

A 7 1/2-cent hourly wage boost has been voted by IWA-CIO pine workers but it is unofficially understood here that an offer of another 5 cents hourly might be acceptable to the union. Originally the union asked for wage increases and other benefits amounting to about 45 cents an hour.

American Federation of Labor lumber workers received a 7 1/2-cent hourly wage increase effective January 1, but K. A. Gordon, business agent of the AFL union here, has asked Chet Irving, PIRC, to re-open the workers' contract with employers.

Irving said that a meeting with AFL negotiators probably would be scheduled for this week-end or next week.


Generally the AFL and CIO lumber wage scales are the same. In the fir industry at Eugene AFL workers have been offered an additional 5 cents.

The 12 1/2-cent boost agreement reached at Portland for CIO fir workers will be retroactive until April 1 if ratified by workers and employers.
