CHICAGO, April 6 (AP)—Grain futures followed an uncertain course at the board of trade today. Advances and declines were moderate. Announcement by the commodity credit corporation that it had purchased 610,000 bushels of wheat yesterday gave wheat reason for a mild advance, but this was offset by reports of good progress in European crops.

Stocks Show Some Gains

NEW YORK, April 6 (AP)—Stocks generally got another leg up on recovery today, although many market leaders were more or less indifferent. Prices hardened selectively after considerable forenoon irregularity. Assorted oils, rails and industrials were ahead fractions to around 3 points near the close.

Body Found In Pit River

ALTURAS, April 6.—The body of Fred Bailey, 72-year-old retired rancher, was found late Monday floating in the Pit river near Alturas, immediately back of the home of Modoc county District Attorney Charles Lederer.

Officers today are trying to determine whether Bailey died a natural death or was murdered. Mrs. Anna Wall of Alturas reported the man's body in the river about 3:30 p. m.

A mark on the man's head may indicate that he was struck a heavy blow and Lederer said that Bailey may have been dead when his body went into the river. There was no water in his lungs to indicate death by drowning.

An autopsy was being performed today in an effort to determine cause of death. Bailey was an old-timer around Alturas and used to run a ranch. Witnesses who might know how long his body had been in the river were being sought.

Births Top Deaths Five To One Here. The old man with the long white beard, always an unwelcome visitor, was outdistanced during the month of March by the stork who left 119 births as compared to 26 deaths.

The number of births was heaviest last September when 123 babies were left. March babies included 55 males, 64 females, one pair of twins and one set of triplets. The twins expired as did one of the triplets, according to the month end report from the Klamath county health department.
