# PO Receipts Triple Here In 15 Years

Postal receipts have grown in Klamath county for the past 15 years to triple the amount of \$72,375.05 which was the total for the first quarter of 1933. Receipts for the first quarter of that year were \$16,088.37 and for the first quarter of 1948 were \$56,930.06.

Revenue from postal sales reached \$241,790.29, in the peak year, 1945, when the army and navy stations were established here and the town was straining at the seams with outsiders.

Although receipts dropped off after the military institutions were evacuated and the year 1946 dipped to below even 1944 which was the next highest in postal gain, still they were a peacetime high of \$212,130.16 which increased to \$224,732.34 in 1947 and is creeping still higher in 1948, as indicated in receipts for the first quarter this year.

# Pigg Files Demurrer

Demurrers to the indictment charging Willis Glen Pigg, 23, and Norman Albert Priest, 21, with contributing to the delinquency of two minor girls have been filed by Attorney U. S. Balentine and today Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg set Saturday at 10 a. m. as time for argument.

The demurrers claim that the indictments do not state facts sufficient to constitute a crime.

The young men are accused of keeping the two girls, aged 14, out all night without consent of their parents. Pigg and Priest are held in the county jail while the girls are in juvenile detention.

Monday afternoon in court David Nathaniel Stewart, 19, was sentenced to serve three years in the Oregon state prison for burglary.

The Miami, Fla., magazine salesman admitted burglarizing the Pelican City home of Oliver C. Herzog April 2, taking a saxophone and a metal strong box. He waived grand jury indictment.

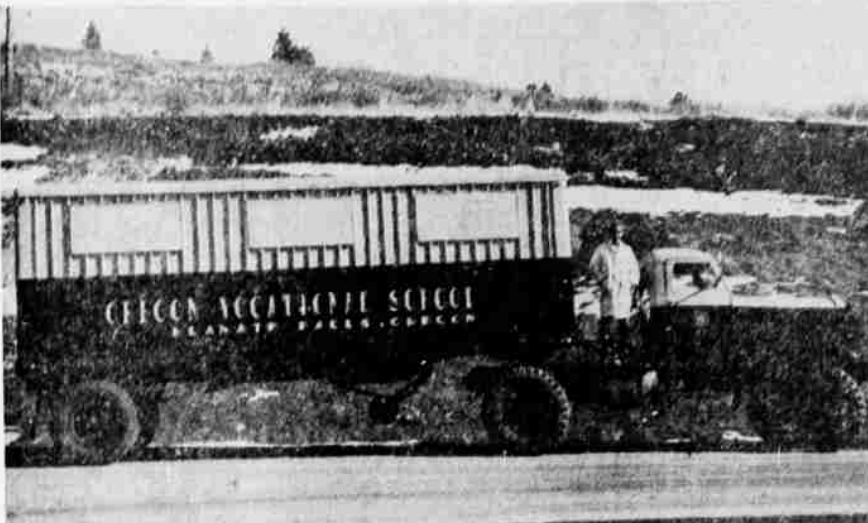

# OVS Gets Big Supply Of Radar Gear

OVS, April 6 — Oregon Vocational school director, Winston D. Purvine, has received word that OVS will receive 17,400 pounds of surplus radar and electronic equipment from the Oakland army air base.

The OVS semi-truck and trailer left a few days ago for Oakland, Calif. to pick up the 84 pieces of equipment and is expected back this Thursday. Equipment will be used largely for the radio communications and radio servicing classes, but some will go toward maintenance and in other classes, Purvine said.

J. Walter O'Lair, war assets administration official of San Francisco, notified Purvine that the equipment was allocated to OVS. The truck and trailer being used to bring the shipment here are army and navy surplus materials. The trailer was formerly an army mobile clothing repair unit and was worked over by OVS students. The truck was navy equipment. Auto mechanics students rebuilt the vehicle and the body and fender class painted the truck-trailer. Total cost of reconstruction was \$425, Purvine said.
