Cooperation Urged In Travel Trade

PULLMAN, April 7 (AP)—A federal official today advised northwest states to cooperate with existing travel agencies in promoting tourist trade.

James Bossemeyer of Washington, D. C., representing the national park service travel division, said his agency was anxious to cooperate with states. He addressed the first annual tourist and resort conference at Washington State college. State officials and other delegates from Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana are attending.

Some officials in Washington, Bossemeyer said, want Americans to travel abroad to assist the economy of foreign nations. He said he opposed this idea on the grounds that the United States' own travel industry should be protected. His agency is trying to promote a favorable "balance of tourist trade" with other nations, he said.

D. W. Clarke of the Washington state fish and game department said yesterday the state does not have enough big game to justify travel promoters in inviting tourists to hunt in Washington. He said the state has enough fish for both residents and visitors.

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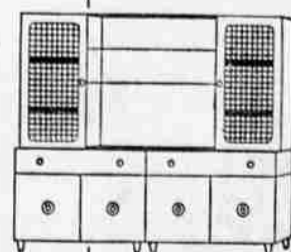
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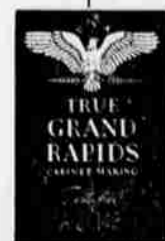
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
