Hampton Building To Be Razed

The old Hampton building at Main and Center streets, oldest standing business structure in the city, will be torn down by order of the city park board. Mayor Ed Ostendorf announced today.

Acting on a report by City Building Inspector Walter Salsbery and Councilman W. D. Miller, the park board decided in a meeting Tuesday that the building is unsafe for public gatherings.

A few weeks ago, the Hampton building was subject of a controversy between the Klamath Art association and Eubolona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. Each wanted use of the building as a meeting place.

The board's decision was reversed after Miller and Salsbery's investigation showed that the cost of renovating the building would be far more than its value or the use that civic groups would get from it, the mayor said.

To preserve the historical value of the Hampton building, however, the park board will save the stone, the mayor added, and use it in either another structure or a monument of some kind on the park property.

The board has acquired an area of property from Center street to Link river for development as a city park.
