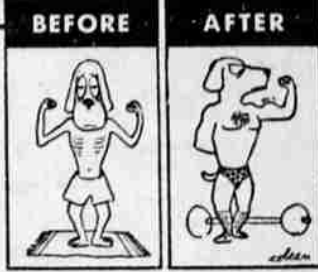
manager for radio station KFLW. The little girl tipped hospital scales at 7 pounds 10 1/2 ounces. She has been named Barbara and is their third child and second girl.
