

Dewey Goes All-Out For Farm Vote

EN ROUTE WITH DEWEY THROUGH NEBRASKA, April 8 (AP)—Governor Thomas E. Dewey, aware defeat in Nebraska's primary might knock vital props from under his presidential chances, made a full scale bid today for the farm vote in this agricultural state.

The New Yorker called for "home-rule" development of the Missouri Valley basin, federal price support of farm products, extensive soil conservation and maximum production of food.

Strong Policy

"The time has come," he said in a speech prepared for a rally at Holdrege, "when we must establish a strong national policy, first against waste of our water resources, second against waste of our soil resources, and third against waste of our food resources."

In Nebraska's republican preferential primary next Tuesday he is stacked against Harold E. Stassen and General Douglas MacArthur, who routed him in the Wisconsin primary. He also is pitted against Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, Governor Earl Warren of California, Senator Arthur W. Vandenberg of Michigan and House Speaker Joseph W. Martin Jr.

Stassen and Taft are considered Dewey's chief opponents in Nebraska. Under the Nebraska primary system voters indicate their preference for the candidates but no one is bound by the results. They also select the state's 15 delegates to the GOP national convention. The delegates are uncommitted.

In his Holdrege speech, Dewey endorsed the Pick-Sloan plan for developing the Missouri river and its tributaries. "I am especially interested," he added, "in seeing to it that this great basin development is carried out as a project in cooperative control with full participation of the states and the property holders in this great area."

Suspect Held In Bank Theft

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 8 (AP)—A man identified by the federal bureau of investigation as a one-time card dealer and son of a former mayor of Grand Junction, Tenn., was being held here today on a charge of aiding in the holdup of a Spokane bank two weeks ago.

He was Robert Howard Roche, 42, of Spokane.

D. S. Hostetter, special agent in charge of the Memphis FBI, said Roche was charged with aiding Josephine Bernice Ray, now held in Spokane in a Spokane bank robbery March 29.

The agent said Roche claimed he waited outside the bank in a taxi while the woman entered and held up the bank. He quoted Roche as saying he took half the stolen money and departed.

The bank's loss was reported at \$1200.

In Seattle, Special Agent J. B. Wilcox said Roche had been a card dealer at Chelan and Spokane. He came to the northwest first in 1929 and had been here intermittently since then, Wilcox said.

Roche's father, the agent said, was a former justice of the peace and mayor of Grand Junction, Tenn.

Teacher Firing Leads To Row

MYRTLE POINT, Ore., April 8 (AP)—Dismissal of two teachers here has involved the school board and Principal Floyd Summers in a dispute with citizens who have protested the action.

Howard Whitaker, board chairman, told a delegation of 20 yesterday that the schools "run smoother" without the two teachers. The board also defended Summers against accusations that he was spending too much of his time working as a bookkeeper for a logging firm.

The citizens protested the dismissals after the teachers, Mrs. Lucille Trigg and Mrs. Vida Prince, asserted they were not re-hired because they complained about lack of heat and building sanitary conditions.

Board Chairman Whitaker admitted the board perhaps had been too zealous in attempting to save the taxpayers' money.

Douglas Write-In Campaign Planned

PORTLAND, April 8 (AP)—Plans for a write-in campaign for Justice William O. Douglas as a vice presidential candidate in Oregon's democratic presidential preference ballot were reported today.

Monroe Sweetland, publisher of the Molalla pioneer and the Newport News, said the campaign would be sponsored by a number of Oregon weekly newspaper publishers. He did not list them.

The Molalla publisher is chairman of the re-elect Truman committee of Oregon and candidate for democratic national committeeman. He said the sponsors consider Douglas an ideal running mate for the president.

There are no candidates filed for the vice presidential nomination in the Oregon preferential primary. A token vote would give Douglas a pledged delegation at the national convention.

Missing Man Found Safe

PORTLAND, April 8 (AP)—A University of Washington student who disappeared from class a month ago was returned to his family here last night.

Sheriff's Captain Early Stanley said the young disabled veteran, Stanley Mewhirter, 23, had been here for a month. He was traced yesterday to a cleaning firm by a fellow worker who saw the student's picture on a missing persons leaflet.

The young man walked out of a classroom at the university March 5 and failed to return. Stanley said the youth appeared not to be aware of his identity when confronted by

deputies. He told them he could remember nothing prior to March 7 when he awoke here at the Admiral hotel. Later he changed to the New Riz hotel, where he was found. He had registered as Jess Sitt, Los Angeles.

The tip to his whereabouts came when Gladys Anderson reported to her employer that Mewhirter—hired as Sitt March 30—looked like the man pictured in a leaflet she found on a street car.

Krater Staff Gets Away With Murder On April One

Staff members of the Klamath Krater, official organ of Klamath Union high school, went literally "hog-wild" on their most recent issue, the April Fool edition, which was published Monday.

The entire six pages of the bi-weekly publication were devoted exclusively to April Fool fiction, much of it quite pointed in meaning, and newswriters were given their yearly opportunity to give vent to all those urges that crop up in every journalist, whether aspiring or professional.

Teachers and students—even the adviser and editor of the paper—suffered alike at the hands of the staff. Equally atrocious as the story content was the page make-up, with the front page upside down and stories and ads placed upside down, sideways and in some cases, cut in half.

The capture of a well-organized counterfeiting ring, composed of faculty members, headlined front-page news, complete with a cut of the game's "escape route." The flagpole "chopped down" and resting conveniently in the main office window, where the "gun-battle" between treasury agents and the gang took place. Actually, the picture was taken some years ago when the flag pole had rotted out and fallen into the office window.

Faculty members came in for a good share of the ribbing, but the advertisers also fared poorly. One ad from a local flower shop urged readers to "Say it with a cactus," while a display from another establishment bore a startling "It's—"

If you want dull lead pencils and dingy blotting cards, the service is bad, but we don't care, if you go away mad." Still another business wrecker claimed of a local coffee-shop, "Every customer on the second Tuesday of each week will be escorted by his choice of a beautiful Blonde—Brunette—Redhead."

Belief was expressed by the adviser, Howard B. Holt, that he might very possibly be open for a new job this week, and fears were also expressed for the future standing of the editor with the school's administration, but since no repercussions were heard, the door of the Krater office has reportedly been unbarred.

Farm Loan Figure Up

SALEM, April 8 (AP)—Oregon's World War II veterans have borrowed \$3,500,000 from the state to build or buy farms and homes, the state department of veterans affairs said today.

The state started giving the loans 2½ years ago. The loans now are running about \$500,000 a month.

Veterans who were Oregon residents before entering the service can get loans. They can borrow up to 75 per cent of the appraised value of the home or farm being bought. The maximum loan is \$5000, the interest rate is four per cent, and the average loan is to be repaid in 12 years.
