

Presbyterian Youths To Meet Tuesday

TULELAKE, April 9.—The Westminster Fellowship of Youth Presbyterians of Southwest Oregon will meet in open sessions Tuesday afternoon, April 13, at 2 o'clock in Peace Memorial church on South Sixth in Klamath Falls. Plans for the meeting of young people, that is expected to bring delegates from all of Southern Oregon, were announced Thursday by Rev. Francis Chambers, assistant pastor of the Tulelake Community Presbyterian church, who is young people's advisor.

The principal speaker at the afternoon meeting will be George L. Thomas, director, division of social relations, Portland council of churches, a negro, who will address the group on "Human Understanding."

A 6 o'clock banquet is planned for Tuesday evening in the First Presbyterian church, Klamath Falls, with Malcolm Crawford, Tulelake, chairman. Crawford is also in charge of all arrangements for the youth meeting.

Rev. John Imbach, youth secretary, Los Angeles, will be the banquet speaker.

Following the banquet the delegates will go to Peace Memorial church for talks by Phil Hitchcock, Klamath Falls, and Mr. Thomas. At 9 p. m. there will be a recreational hour in the Altamont Junior high school with Rev. Kenneth Brown, pastor of the Merrill Presbyterian church in charge.

Worship services for all sessions will be in charge of Stanley McClellan, Klamath Falls, moderator of the youth group; Peggy Terry, Tulelake, and James Moe, Lakeview.

Group singing will be led by Marilee Crawford and Mary Lou Bates, Klamath Falls.
