Indians Open Dam Fight
 YAKIMA, April 12 (AP)—The Yakima and Nez Perce Indian tribes open their battle in federal court today to block construction of McNary dam.
 Federal Judge Sam M. Driver was to begin a hearing of their suit shortly after opening U. S. district court sessions here at 10 a. m.
 The tribes seek an injunction restraining the government from proceeding with construction of the dam on the Columbia river. They won the right to prosecute their suit on Jan. 21 when Judge Driver, sitting in Spokane, denied a government motion to dismiss the case.
 The civil docket of this term of court has been so arranged that the hearing may continue all week. Kenneth R. L. Simmons of Billings, Mont., and Edwin C. Davis are counsel for the plaintiffs. Simmons is a former counsel for the department of the interior.
 The basis of the tribal suit is the contention that construction of McNary dam would violate a fishing rights treaty which was signed June 9 1855, at Walla Walla. Parties to the treaty were Isaac I. Stevens, Washington's first territorial governor; Chief Kamiakin, head of the Yakima nation, and 13 other tribal chieftains and delegates.
