

Tulelake Rainbow Sends Aid Abroad

TULELAKE—Two refugee girls, one a resident of France and the other of Finland, have been adopted by the Tulelake Assembly, Order of the Rainbow for girls, and are being sent packages of clothing, food and small gifts. Names of the girls were obtained through the "Have the Children Federation," New York.

A number of letters, written in French, snapshots and postal cards have been received by the assembly from Françoise Crouvisier, Has Beillard par GARARDIER (Vosges) France in which she describes the shortages of food and clothing.

Her father is dead and her mother, who is ill much of the time, is a weaver.

Françoise is 14 years old but because of financial difficulties cannot attend school. She is apprenticed in a weaving shop, making bobbins, and hopes to graduate some day to be a lace-maker.

In her introductory letter to the assembly she wrote: "The Germans burned our houses. We were terrified when we saw them come. The little village of Gerardier has become ashes. In our little rye, very little hay—our region is not fertile this year because of the drought. I do not understand 'American'—we have to have your letters translated. I hope that you can do the same. I haven't many warm clothes. A warm coat would be most useful because it is very cold in the winter. Wool is very scarce in France."

Letters sent by the assembly are translated for Françoise by Red Cross representatives, who in turn write for her.

Pirkko Annikki Kahkonen of Juuka, Ahimovaara, Hyttia, Finland, has been more recently adopted.

To further assist with this work, the Tulelake assembly will entertain Sunday afternoon, May 9, at a silver tea to be given at the annex of the Tulelake Community Presbyterian church from 2 until 4 o'clock, California time.

There will be a program and refreshments and the public is invited to attend and to help with this worthy project.

New officers of the assembly will be installed May 19 with Patsy and Peggy Terry, twin sisters, to serve during the administration, as worthy advisers. Patsy is in the chair, but since both girls leave next fall for school and Peggy will not have an opportunity to fill the worthy advisor's chair when her term comes, they will officiate together.
