Marshall Blames Reds For Revolt

BOGOTA, Colombia, April 14 (AP)—Secretary of State George C. Marshall blames international communism for the abortive revolution which ravaged Bogota and disrupted the Pan-American conference.

Marshall told newsmen and conference delegates Monday night that the revolt followed the same pattern as outbreaks which have provoked labor troubles in France and pre-election unrest in Italy.

Mr. Marshall delegates are expected to ratify today their determination to continue the conference here, despite the riot which has disrupted much of the city and killed 200 persons. Earlier sources close to Marshall said the U. S. had taken the stand the conference must remain at Bogota.

Marshall is the first conference delegate outside the Colombian government, publicly to attribute the revolution to world communism and indirectly to Russia.

The Colombian government announced yesterday that it had severed diplomatic relations with the Soviet Union. Two Russian, described as communist agents, were among persons taken into custody on charges of having started the riot.

Rep. Donald L. Jackson (R-Calif.), a member of the U. S. delegation, said yesterday that he was returning to Washington today to report to congress on the revolution.

Pilot Safe After Crash On Mt. Hood

TIMBERLINE LODGE, Ore.
April 14 (AP)—A ski searching party Tuesday rescued an army pilot who survived a crash on 11,246-foot-high Mt. Hood and wandered in a dazed condition over the peak's icy slopes.

Sighted from the air on the exposed slope, the pilot, Lt. Edward K. Kabanov of McChord field, Wash., was picked up shortly after noon by a rescue party that had been guided to the scene by the searching plane.

He was put aboard a forest service snow tractor, which began a journey around the southern side of the highest Oregon mountain. Radio reports from the scene said the rescue party would go to the nearest road—the Washington cutoff highway on the south side of the mountain.

The report said Kabanov was suffering from a night of exposure, but was in fairly good condition. An ambulance was dispatched from Sandy, Ore., on the shoulders of the mountain, to meet the snow tractor at the road.

Kabanov had been on the mountain approximately 26 hours from the time his small Liaison plane crashed shortly before nightfall yesterday.

His plane was caught in a downdraft and struck the mountain at the 8500-foot level, while he was searching for an Oregon national guard plane missing since Friday with three men aboard.

Follow pilots saw him emerge from the plane's wreckage, and rescue operations started at once.

Security Loan Drive Slated

The first bond drive since the Victory Loan drive of 1945 will be launched here April 15, with Andrew M. Collier again serving as bond chairman.

To be known as the "Security Loan Drive," the campaign will be concluded on June 30. Oregon's goal will be \$23,750,000, but the Klamath quota has not yet been announced.

Collier has asked J. V. Owens to serve as his vice-chairman. He said that many of the war-time bond workers will be used, but that he plans also to draft a new, younger group to "put power into the effort."

Collier said that the purpose of security loan drive is to fight inflation and to broaden the base of the national debt. It is hoped to cut down that portion of the debt owned by the banks.

Former Bookkeeper Here Arrested On Forgery Count

Dean Johnson, former bookkeeper for Klamath Concrete Pipe company and survivor of the blast which destroyed the company's office on Market street last December 7, was under arrest Tuesday and being brought back from Portland to face a charge of larceny by forgery.

Specifically, Johnson is accused of forging a check for \$74.97 on the company, endorsing it over to himself and cashing it. That was on October 28.

As bookkeeper for the pipe company, Johnson handled the payroll checks.

Floyd Somers, former owner of the company, signed the complaint against his former employee. He was arrested in Portland Monday night on information relayed to Portland police by Sheriff Lloyd L. Low.

Deputy Sheriff Marion Barnes was in Salem Monday and he was notified to pick up Johnson in Portland and bring him back to Klamath Falls. His bail has been set at \$3500.

The Klamath Concrete Pipe company was recently sold to Cal Peyton and is now being operated as a branch of Peyton and company.

Last December 7—Pearl Harbor anniversary—at 1 o'clock in the morning the pipe company office building was destroyed by a blast presumably touched off when an iron rod fell off a shelf into a box of dynamite kept in the office vault.

Dean Johnson, the bookkeeper, had come to work 1 1/2 hours Sunday morning about 6:30, but was out of the building when the explosion came. He told officers that he had stepped out for a few minutes to get a cup of coffee.

Actually, the cause of the dynamite blast was never officially determined by police. The office was wrecked but did not burn and the records of Johnson's bookkeeping were not destroyed.

Johnson had been employed by the company over a year but had quit his job and left Klamath Falls about two weeks ago.

A fuller investigation into his bookkeeping is now being made, but just the one check is involved in the charge against Johnson at present.

Search For Plane Goes On At Hood

PORTLAND, April 14 (AP)—Search continued today for a missing Oregon national guard plane while a pilot who crashed in the hunt was back at McChord field.

Lt. Edward J. Kabanov, rescued yesterday from the northwest side of towering Mount Hood where his Liaison plane had crashed Monday, said "I was just lucky."

Telling of being caught in a violent downdraft while searching for the 6-26 which disappeared Friday en route from McChord to Portland, Kabanov said "I gave her full throttle to try to pull her nose up but she was going down 2000 feet a minute. I bailed out just before she hit."

Teeth Missing
When he regained consciousness a short time later, he had a missing tooth, four teeth missing, a knee out and broken. The light plane was being searched about by the wind, he said, so because of that and the cold, he headed for timber. When he got there he built a fire and tried to stay awake, but slept a few hours.

The next morning he realized planes were looking for him and he wanted to show the new him and ground parties were guided to him. He was brought out by snow tractor and was reported in good condition.
