

Southwest Power Line Plea Made

WASHINGTON, April 13 (AP)—Power lines running into Southwest Oregon are so overloaded that new lines must be built, a congressional committee was told today.

Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.) urged the house interior appropriations subcommittee to provide \$2,579,000 in money and \$853,000 in contract authority for the additional lines.

He said that in the peak period of 1947 a total of 49,000 kilowatts was taken from the Bonneville power administration lines to augment public and private power facilities in the Lower and Upper Willamette valley and Southwestern Oregon.

Growth Seen
"The best evidence available indicates that this supplemental supply of 49,000 kilowatts will grow to 76,000 kilowatts within the next two years and to 265,000 kilowatts by 1954," Ellsworth testified.

Ellsworth said the money he asked would take care of the Salem-Albany-Lebanon, the Eugene-Redmond, the Reedsport-Coos Bay and the Cottage Grove-Drain lines and the Detroit substation.

"The southwestern section of the state of Oregon," Ellsworth said, "is the most rapidly expanding section of the entire Pacific Northwest."

The representative also asked ample appropriations for Crater Lake national park, to permit rehabilitation of tourist facilities, and an increase from \$10,000 to \$25,000 of funds for roads and trails at the Oregon Caves national monument.

Powell River Plant Shows Profit Up

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 13 (AP)—Powell River Company limited, one of Canada's largest newspaper paper producers, had a net profit of \$6,012,349 in 1947.

Harold S. Foley, president, in the annual report Monday reported the net equaled \$4.47 a share, a large increase over the 1946 earnings of \$3.440.378 or \$2.56 a share.

"The successful result may be attributed mainly to improved operating efficiency," he said. Capital improvements for the year totaled \$6,000,000. A total of \$4,579,000 was paid in dominion and provincial taxes.

Merrill Shop Looted

MERRILL, April 13—Jerry's Place, a sandwich shop located in the Hodges building on Main street in Merrill, was entered and robbed sometime between the hours of 1 and 5 a. m. Friday, according to City Marshall Smith.

The cash drawer was removed and some change taken from it, but a sack containing approximately \$45 near the drawer was overlooked. Several checks that were in the cash box were scattered over the floor. The bandits took one 10 cent and one 25 cent slot machine, broke them open, removed the money and threw the machines into Lost River at a point behind the building. The machines were recovered Sunday morning when the garbage man and city water-man were doing a clean-up job along the river bank and spied the machines in the shallow water.

Jerry Hodges, manager of the shop, said he could not state definitely how much change was in the cash drawer, but estimated that approximately 40 or 50 dollars was in the slot machines.

Entry into the building was by breaking a rear window and unlocking the back door from the inside. Smith said it appears that the prowlers wore overshoes and gloves as no prints were found. According to Smith, the bandits must have watched him closely to determine his whereabouts at the time the job was pulled because he does not check the downtown district on a regular schedule.
