

\$6 Flax Seed Price Okayed

Flax seed produced in 1948 will be guaranteed a price of \$6.00 per bushel by government purchase, according to the county agent's office. Lake county farmers can produce good yield of flax, and interested men will be on the lookout for seed this spring. According to the county agent, flax seed may be obtained at Tulelake for \$9.00 a bushel treated. Seed is hard to find and this supply will be welcome news.

Flax is frequently planted as a nurse crop with pasture or alfalfa since it does not shade the ground as grains do. Dry land growers usually plant 35 pounds to the acre, while irrigated land requires 45 pounds, or about one bushel. Yields produced in this area will vary from ten bushel to 25, according to the soil and moisture conditions.

Tips On Taking Mud Stains Out

Late spring rains and snow keep the problem of mud stains with us. Mud holds a strange attraction for children but is hard on clothes and floors.

Suggestions from Home Demonstration Agent Helen P. Sime are offered here to help combat the problem.

For muddy clothes it is best to let the fabric dry first, then brush it well and sponge with clear water. If any stain is left, sponge again with rubbing alcohol. For colored materials or acetate rayon, dilute the alcohol with water, using about one-third water.

The same method goes for rugs, providing they are of the type that can take moisture. The twist of the pile of some rugs is removed with moisture.

The longer mud stays on leather the worse the stain is likely to be. Wet mud should be scraped off shoes as soon as possible, then wipe the leather with a soft cloth. Shoes should be dried slowly then re-polished.

Windbreak Tree Supply Holds Out

The supply of windbreak trees ordered for Lake county farmers by the county agent's office appears to be ample for everyone. Extension workers hope all of these trees will be picked up to make full use for Lake county farmers.

The earlier the trees are obtained by farmers and planted the better will be their condition. At the present time they are trenced in a post office building.

The plants must be moved in the near future, and all ranchers who want to get started on a tree-planting program will be able to obtain as many trees as desired directly from the county agent's office.

Seed Planting Care Urged

The time for planting lawns and gardens is here, that is, if we don't have any more winter. Prospective purchasers of seeds will find it pays to read labels carefully before buying.

The federal seed act of 1939 requires that all seed shipped in interstate commerce must be fully and accurately labeled to indicate the quality of the seed. The label on lawn seed must show the percent of purity, the amount of noxious

weeds and the percent of germination.

Other provisions of the law require that seeds must have been tested for germination within six months prior to date of sale. Vegetable seeds which are below standard in germination may be sold only when so labeled.

Reading the labels on seed containers may pay off in a better crop of vegetables or a thicker stand of grass in your new lawn, with less weeds.

- 1 1/2 cups grated sharp American cheese
- 6 slices bacon, cooked crisp and crumbled

Pour custard mixture into pastry lined baking dish. Bake in a preheated very hot oven, 450°, for 10 minutes. Lower heat to a slow oven, 300°, and continue baking 30 minutes longer, until custard is set. Cut into squares and serve hot. Garnish with additional crisp, cooked bacon, if desired. 6 servings.
