## Indians Close Dam Case

**YAKIMA, April 14 (AP)**—Efforts of the Yakima and Nez Perce Indian tribes to halt construction of McNary dam drew the answering fire of government witnesses today.

Attorneys for the two tribes closed their case yesterday. The action is based on the contention that construction of the Columbia river dam would damage the river's salmon runs and thereby violate a fishing rights treaty signed in 1855.

A motion to dismiss the action was denied in court yesterday, but Federal Judge Sam M. Driver said he would retain the privilege of entertaining the motion later after hearing all the evidence.

The dismissal was asked by Marvin Sosnosky, attorney for the defendant Guy P. Atkinson Construction company. He said the Indian testimony failed to show that the dam would damage salmon runs sufficiently to warrant an injunction against further work.

Two government witnesses made brief appearances before court adjournment yesterday. One was George K. Schoch, government civil engineer in charge of construction. He said work on the first section of the McNary cofferdam should be completed in early May.
