

Buckeye Grid Talent Plays For Pro Team

Fans Want Brown Back At Helm Of Ohio State Squad

NEW YORK, April 16 (NEA)—Spring football practice throughout the land again brings up the amusing situation at Ohio State, where on all week-ends what should be the varsity goes off to play with the professional Cleveland Browns. Graduation claimed only quarterback Billy Doolittle, end Jimmy Crane, guard Bob Jabusch and center Howard Duncan, which doesn't mean a thing.

But backs Ollie Cline, Bob Brugge and Dean Semaubaugh, among the very last of the Paul Brown men in Scarlet and Gray, are the newest additions to their old coach's money ranks.

They swell to a dozen or more the number of Browns who had from one to three years of eligibility remaining at Ohio State.

Cline is a phenomenal fullback, almost frightfully fast for a 210-pounder. Brugge is a big and fine all-around back, Semaubaugh a remarkable runner.

OTHER TROUBLES
Wesley Feeler's troubles do not end with the raids of Brown of the Browns, however, for since spring drills started he has lost his two slickest sophomore backs.

Park Blubaugh decided to abandon football because of a bad knee. Bob Wright signed a baseball contract with the Detroit Tigers.

"Losing Blubaugh and Wright, especially Blubaugh, is quite a blow," says Coach Feeler. "He was really a sweetheart—big, fast and rough. He was one of the best prospects I've ever seen. Wright was good, too."

Making things worse at Ohio State, the freshman crop of 1947 was the slimmest and poorest in quality in a decade.

It sent up no more than six or seven men of varsity caliber. Peeved at one of their own, Brown, being denied the athletic directorship, and disliking the confusion there, the state high school coaches steer the better boys away from Ohio State.

The alumni is about evenly divided on Brown, who practically is campaigning to return to Columbus, despite his remunerative position in the All-America conference. The old grads either swear by him or at him.

But all agree that Brown will have to be restored before things will get better.

BROWN RETURNING
Feeler has another year to go on his contract, but another autumn such as last, when the Bucks won only two of nine, and the Monday morning quarterbacks will be decorating High Street with him.

The consensus is that Brown will be back in command within a couple of years, perhaps in 1949. The fellow is peculiarly cut out for the job.

Meanwhile, Cline, Brugge, and Semaubaugh join the Browns' group at Ohio State, where the remarkable professional end Dante Lavelle and place-kicker Lou Groza are roommates, for example, Brown doesn't want football bums, insists the lads complete their education.

Paul Brown has bobbed up with something new at that, puts an end to all the squawking about the non-purity of college athletics. The Ohio State Browns are being paid, and that's all there is to it.

The ideal solution at Ohio State might be to book the Browns in Ohio Stadium.

Then the Ohio State Browns wouldn't have to leave the campus.

Steelers Pick Assistant To Replace Jock

PITTSBURGH, April 16 (AP)—Johnny Michelson, assistant coach of the National Football league's Pittsburgh Steelers, said Thursday he has agreed to a two-year contract as head coach.

Michelson, 32, will be the youngest coach in the league. He takes the place of Dr. Jock Sutherland, who died unexpectedly Sunday after undergoing two emergency operations for removal of a brain tumor.

"All that remains is the actual signing of the contract," Michelson said. "I have agreed to the terms and tenure of the contract."

Michelson was Sutherland's right-hand man. He played quarterback for Sutherland at the University of Pittsburgh in 1925-26-37.

The following year he became an assistant coach under Sutherland, but left school at the end of the season when Sutherland resigned after Pitt adopted a "de-emphasis" program.

In 1940 and 1941 Michelson rejoined Sutherland as an assistant coach when the famed mentor was with the Brooklyn Dodgers, then of the National league. After more than three seasons in the navy, Michelson became Sutherland's assistant with the Steelers for the 1946 and 1947 seasons.

Sutherland had a five-year contract expiring in 1951, when he died. Friends predicted that he planned to resign then, turning the reins over to Michelson.

Elk Barbecue Set For Bull Sale

Buyers, consignors and friends attending the first annual Klamath Falls registered and commercial Aberdeen Angus sale at the fairgrounds this coming Monday, April 19, will be treated to an elk barbecue.

The two elk to be served were fattened by C. V. (Chet) Barton at his Black and White ranch in Poe valley. The meat will be prepared and barbecued by G. B. Fleet.

The barbecue will immediately precede the sale (1 p. m. at the fairgrounds), which will see 55 head of registered Aberdeen Angus sold. About 50 head of commercial Angus females will also be auctioned off in pens of five.

Mine Decision Due Monday

WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP)—Judge T. Alan Goldsborough today heard arguments in John L. Lewis' contempt trial and put off any decision until Monday.

Assistant Attorney General H. Graham Morrison argued for the government that Lewis and the United mine workers were clearly in contempt of court for continuing a coal mine work stoppage for a week after a court order was issued for it to end.

Attorneys for Lewis made only a one-sentence argument: "The government has failed to prove its case."

"That came from Welly K. Hopkins, chief of the eight-man battery of counsel Lewis has. Goldsborough then adjourned court until Monday.

Now the only thing left in the contempt case is the judge's ruling—and the punishment if the ruling is for conviction.

Jew Forces Score Victory

JERUSALEM, April 15 (AP)—Jewish sources said today 2000 Jewish fighters have scored a "decisive victory" over the Arab volunteer army led by Fawzi Bey Al Kaukji in Northern Palestine.

The informants reported 200 Arab casualties and said the Jews captured seven field guns.

The Arab league in Cairo had reported that Fawzi Bey's forces at Mishmar Haemek, 15 miles southeast of Haifa, had been encircled by 12,000 fighters of Haganah, the Jewish militia, but an Arab spokesman here declared the reverse was true.

The spokesman, Ahmed Hilmi Pasha of the Arab higher executive, said that the Jews were being surrounded by Arabs. However, the Arab league headquarters in Cairo had taken a grave view of Fawzi Bey's situation. A Jewish source said the Cairo announcement was a stunt to gain more help for the Arabs.

The Mishmar Haemek battle between Haganah and part of Fawzi Bey's army has been going on for more than a week.
