

Kidnaper Captured By Youths

PORTLAND, Ore., April 17 (AP)—A couple of children made like detectives after listening to a radio crime program and to everyone's surprise they had a Missouri kidnap suspect in jail here today.

The FBI said the suspect is John Harvey Bogg, 31, object of a 2½ year nationwide hunt as "the man with love on his fingers."

Pauline Virgin, 12, and Navarre Smith, 14, heard a radio program (Gangbusters) tell of a limping horse-lover wanted for kidnaping a Missouri sheriff in 1945. His left fingers were tattooed with the word "L-O-V-E."

"Why, that's Cowboy Jim," said Pauline, referring to a Gearhart, Ore., riding academy employe known as Jim Williams, who always kept his left fingers taped.

Pauline asked him about the tape.

"He was very nasty. I was scared of him after that," she said. She took the tale to her elders, who scoffed.

So Navarre took over. He walked up to a policeman and asked, "Where does the FBI live?"

The policeman listened to the story, called the FBI. But Williams left the riding academy ahead of them. He was traced to Hillsboro, Ore.

There, in a friend's house, said FBI Agent Howard I. Bobbitt, they found Williams or Bogg, snug in hiding under a baby's crib yesterday.

Bobbitt said Bogg is accused of disarming Dade county, Mo. Sheriff Hugh P. Wilkerson as the sheriff was taking him to jail on a forgery charge, November 29, 1945. He forced the sheriff to drive to Oklahoma, robbed him and left him tied to a Kellyville, Okla., utility pole, Bobbitt said.

Bobbitt said Bogg, a former cow-hand and rodeo performer, admitted his identity, and he said he had competed in California rodeos until a year ago.

DAV Commander Raps Vet Care

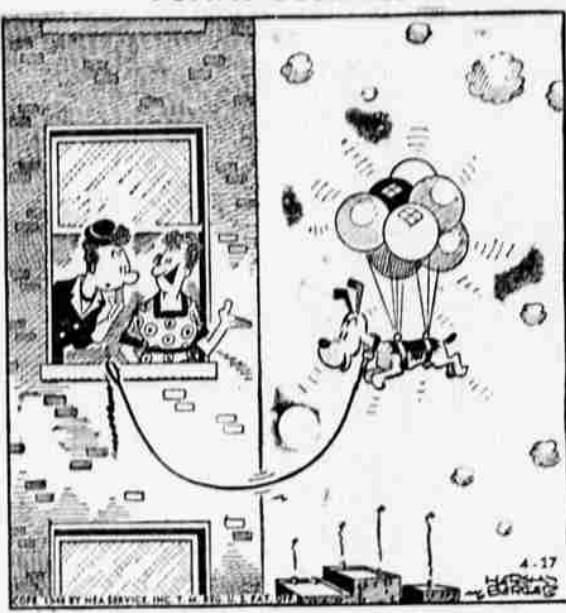
PORTLAND, April 17 (AP)—The national commander of the Disabled American Veterans said yesterday that injured veterans are still being treated as if World War I had just ended.

John L. Giebel, Hibbing, Minn., told an interviewer that while the public is sympathetic toward disabled war veterans, it does not realize all the situation.

Declaring that the \$138 a month totally disabled veteran receives is insufficient to support a family, Giebel said that "present disability pay is largely based on conditions of World War I, and that was mainly a single man's war, World War II wasn't."

Prison Terms Meted Out For Meat Stealing

The recent theft of elk meat from a food locker at Chet Barton's Poe valley ranch paid off Saturday morning in prison terms to Vernon Roy Brown, 22, and his step-father Andrew James Lewis, 40.

Both had pleaded guilty to larceny. Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg sentenced Lewis to five years in the state penitentiary and the younger man, Brown, to 18 months.

Lewis is a former employe of the Barton ranch.

Also in circuit court Saturday, William Jackson Easter, indicted for assault, armed with a dangerous weapon, pleaded not guilty. His trial was set for May 10. Easter's indictment has been through the grand jury mill twice. It was re-submitted to the jury two weeks ago because of a flaw in the allegations.

Easter is accused of shooting and wounding a neighbor, Dick Gaskins, at Easter's California avenue grocery last December.

Another demurrer to the indictment of Archie DeWitt, charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl, was entered by Attorney U. S. Valentine. He asked that the indictment be dismissed because the allegations pertained to more than one crime.

Judge Vandenberg set Monday, April 26, for arguments on the demurrer.

Previously DeWitt's indictment had been re-submitted to the grand jury for clarification of allegations.

Portland Theft Wave Wound Up

PORTLAND, April 17 (AP)—Two long prison terms and a suicide—that was the windup today of Portland's department store robberies.

Donald Everett Bailey, 33, one of the robber trio, was sentenced yesterday to 25 years in the state prison on a charge of assault and armed robbery.

Richard M. Moore, 42, was sentenced last week to life imprisonment. The third man committed suicide before police could catch up with him.

The men admitted robbing three Portland department stores last year.

Hit-Run Driver Posts Bail

Carlos Dwight Galloway, 57, of 715 St. Francis, was arrested Friday afternoon on a warrant charging him with failure to stop at the scene of an accident and failure to make out an accident report.

Galloway assertedly struck a parked car on Oregon avenue April 10. He posted \$100 bail for an appearance in police court.

Social Security Paying Off To Qualified Workers

Are you sitting on \$10,000? Some social security cards are paying off to that tune at the present time in monthly payments over a period of years.

Over eighty million Americans are carrying an insurance policy in their billfolds, many of them without even realizing it, according to John Richardson, local manager of the social security administration office. The little card with a number on it which most workers carry in their pockets is just another card among many to most of them and the one per cent taken from each pay-roll dollar is just deduction to most people.

Many people think social security is some form of charity. This is not true. The old-age and survivors insurance benefits now being paid to retired people and to widows and orphans are real insurance. The payments are a beneficiary's as a legal right. If he meets the requirements of the law as to the amount of covered work, age and so forth, all he has to do is apply and he gets his monthly benefit checks. Here's the way it works: when a man goes to work he gets a social security card. Each time he takes a new job he shows that card to the boss. The employer reports every three months the names, account number, and the amount paid to each person. The central office of the social security administration keeps an individual record of each employe's earnings so that it can pay off when the time comes. The money is invested in a special government trust fund in interest bearing bonds of the United States government, as safe as our government itself. You can get a statement of the wages credited to your account anytime, just by filling out a simple post card form available at the social security office.

If you would like a statement of the wages posted to your account or the insurance provided in your particular case and how it will be paid, just go to the social security administration office, room 366, the post office building, Klamath Falls, Ore., or write a letter giving your name and account number.

Questions regarding old-age and survivors benefits will be answered by Mr. Richardson in a series of articles.
