## Heroic Truck Driver Wins Praise For Saving Child

PORTLAND, April 17—Rescue of a tiny girl from drowning in the black of night brought recognition to a heroic Oregon truck driver in Portland Friday night. Named Driver of the Month and awarded a gold, engraved wristwatch, Eldon Gilliam, 39, of Scappoose, saved the life of a child thrown from a careening vehicle into the waters of a drainage ditch near Goshen on the night of March 29.

Gilliam, driver for Safeway Stores, Inc., came upon an overturned car between Goshen and Creswell on U. S. highway 99 and stopped to see if help was needed. He found a lone woman, Mrs. L. M. Vermote of Oroville, Calif., in a state of hysteria, crying that her baby had been thrown out of her car when it had struck the road shoulder and overturned. In the darkness she had returned in the car to locate the child.

With the terrified mother calling and crying, Gilliam used his flashlight to make a hurried reconstruction of the accident and plot the most likely location of the missing baby. After a brief search he caught a glimpse of a tiny leg protruding from the muddy water of a roadside ditch. The rest of the child completely submerged.

Mrs. Vermote wrote to Gilliam's employer, "She was unconscious. Your driver worked on her little body until the sweat was standing out on his forehead. He got her to breathing again. He then wrapped her up in his jacket and put her in his truck and got her warm. I wish I were able to reward this man. I hope you will give him the best.

In awarding the watch to Gilliam, Frank E. Landsburg, chairman of the Portland traffic safety commission, said this was one of the most heartwarming incidents he had ever known. The award ceremonies were broadcast over station KGW in Portland following a re-enactment of the rescue.

K. E. Pheister, Portland trucking superintendent for Safeway, who nominated Gilliam for the prize, noted that the incident would have ended in tragedy had the driver become excited or given up in his attempt to restore the child's breathing.

"It took forty-five minutes of artificial respiration to renew the spark of life," Pheister said.

Although Gilliam works out of Portland, he lives in Scappoose with his wife and two children. In 12 years of professional driving, he has been charged with only one minor accident. By winning the March Driver of the Month award, he becomes one of the drivers eligible for Oregon and national Driver of the Year awards.

The Oregon trucking industry presents a gold wristwatch each month to an outstanding truck or bus driver, chosen on the basis of heroism, unusual courtesy, or remarkable contributions to safety. The watches are made available by Carl Greve, Portland jeweler. Tire dealer Rudy Nelson has given the transport association \$500 cash, to be awarded to the top driver of the year.

"Truck drivers have been everything from heroes to midwives," said C. O. Knowlton, manager of the Oregon Motor Transport association. "But they're usually too modest to report it. The Driver of the Month contest was started so the public would tell us about these things and we could make appropriate awards."
