She discussed the time it took for the first 15 men searching for a route through the Willamette valley and the troubles encountered on locating the South Road.

Her dates stressed 1846 and 1848, formative years of Oregon territory, and she told of the two years it took for Washington named officials to reach the territory and in the meantime, the naming of Governor Lane who proceeded without the aid of Washington men.

Duncan observed that Oregon had stood strongly for home rule during the years and she brought many interesting little side-lights, including the care of orphans during Oregon's early years, into her talk. She discussed Centennial plans and now various cities in the state were observing the date.

The speaker's talk was ended by reading parts of the diary of O. D. Stearns, who came to Oregon territory as an emigrant child.

Early Oregon songs with music provided by Marie Obenchain, were enjoyed during the evening and an Oregon Quiz was conducted by the program chairman, assisted by Isabel Brixner.

in LaGrange until mid-July when they will return to Klamath Falls to make their home. Mr. Eaton is the nephew of Mrs. William Hall of this city.

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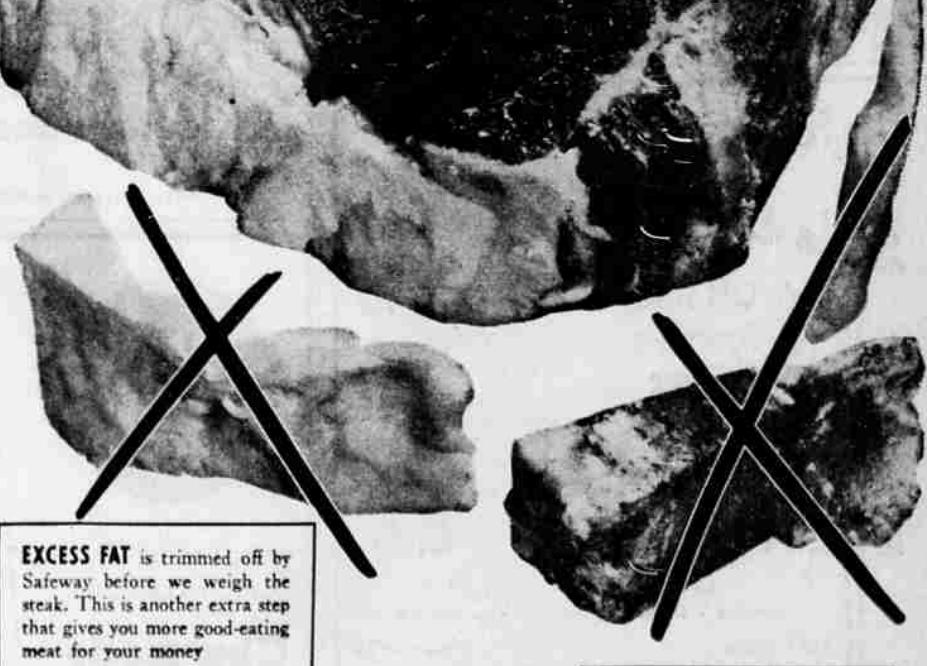
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
