Butte Valley School Bids To Be Called

DORRIS, April 21 — Bids will be called this week for the proposed Butte Valley high school gymnasium. Opening date of bids is May 20. Plans for the gym were submitted by Howard Perrin, Klamath Falls architect, and the structure will be the only regulation size gym in the Siskiyou joint union high school district. The building is made possible by the tax increase voted last October for new construction and modernization of existing facilities. Plans have been approved by the division of school house planning, state department of education, which according to law has to approve all work before it can be done. W. G. Hagebstein of Dorris, clerk of the board, said that in the event an acceptable bid is submitted, plans are to start construction in July. The building should be completed in time for winter indoor sports. Original plans called for construction of the gym as a south wing of the new high school. Ranchers Ask Pest Controls

PENDLETON, April 21 (AP) — Hordes of Mormon crickets are hatching out in the sagebrush, and this area's wheat ranchers want to declare war before the insects invade the grain fields. Officials of the federal bureau of entomology were asked yesterday to eradicate the crickets, but the bureau said funds would permit only control measures. H. E. Weatherford, chairman of the Morrow, Gilliam and Umatilla cricket control committee, said it was hoped the insects could be destroyed while young. Late last summer the crickets moved into green wheat fields in their search for food, but damage was not extensive. The young are hatching in sage lands of Northern Morrow and Gilliam counties and in a part of Umatilla county. This is the section from which the hordes of crickets moved in last year's invasion of the Umatilla depot area.

Harding Loses Right Foot

Major John B. Harding, former Klamath Falls resident and survivor of the army C-47 crash that claimed eight lives near Woodland, Wash., last month, has lost his right foot as a result of the crash, friends learned here this week. Major Harding, who crawled on a broken leg home several miles to seek help, froze his foot during the two days he spent in deep snow. Attempts to restore normal circulation failed. Friends said Harding was "very well" after the amputation, performed at Letterman hospital in San Francisco. Harding has been a patient at Barnes General hospital at Vancouver, Wash., since the crash, but decided to have the surgery performed at Letterman. He is the son of Mrs. C. B. Harding of Portland, well-known here where the family lived for many years.

Jew-Arab Clash Fatal To Nine

JERUSALEM, April 21 (AP) — Jewish sources said five Jews and four Arabs were killed today when Arabs attacked a group of Jews near Ramat Kakovesh, in the Samaritan hills. Jewish informants also reported that Haganah fighters engaged a force of about 100 Arabs in the Bad El Wad area and inflicted heavy losses. The counterattack followed yesterday's Arab smash at a Tel Aviv-Jerusalem food and passenger conveyer in which six Jews were reported killed.

Four-Year-Old Killed By Car

CAMAS, Wash., April 21 (AP) — Four-year-old Donald E. Maxwell was struck by a car and killed in front of his home two miles east of here in Weir Park addition last night. His mother, Mrs. Eldon Maxwell, witnessed the accident. State Patrol Sgt. James Coshaw said Orville T. Smith, Camas, was driver of the car.

Jumping Rubber Discovery Promises Better Automobile Tires Because It Is The Toughest Kind Ever Made

CHICAGO, April 21 (AP) — Jumping rubber, made in a flash so fast that it jumps, promises better automobile tires. The rubber is a new synthetic kind, and extremely tough. It was announced and demonstrated today to the American Chemical society by Prof. Avery A. Morton of Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Dr. Morton had a bottle of butadiene, an oil refinery gas used in making two main kinds of synthetic rubber. He added a few drops of a chemical to the bottle, stoppered it and shook it. Suddenly a long snake-like piece of rubber formed, so violently that the stopper was blown out. The new rubber was born. The secret of its formation lay in the few drops of chemical, which are a catalyst or chemical stimulant. The catalyst is by far the most active and fastest yet found for making rubber, Dr. Morton said. Even though it works so quickly, the process can be controlled easily, he declared. The new rubber, named alfin, eventually may replace all natural and government-synthetic rubbers in automobile tire treads, he said, due to its great strength. One drawback to its use, Dr. Morton said, is that it is so tough that it's difficult to mill or mix with other ingredients used in making tire treads.

GOP Leaders Eye Oregon

PORTLAND, April 21 (AP) — Republican presidential aspirants Thomas E. Dewey of New York and Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota are getting set to make Oregon's May 21 primary a crucial battleground for their candidacies. The state election will be the last major ballot clash between the two young republican leaders before the national convention June 21. Stassen is scheduled to speak here April 26, four days before the New York governor leaves on a western trip that will give him 10 days of campaigning in Oregon. Dewey's secretary, Paul E. Lockwood, has been in the state since Sunday. Two other aides, Hamilton Gaddis and Jules Dulce, are to leave New York for Oregon later this week. The governor's first appearance here will be before the state convention of the Junior chamber of commerce May 1. Other Oregon appearances have not yet been announced. Robert Elliott, Stassen's Oregon committee chairman, announced last night the duration of the former Minnesota governor's Oregon tour has not been decided. He spent four days up-state earlier this year when he personally filed for the party's presidential preference race. At stake are 12 Oregon GOP convention delegates.
