

Action Slow On Military Training Bill

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—Norman Thomas predicted Tuesday that many conscientious Americans will disobey a peacetime draft law if one is passed.

Thomas, several times socialist candidate for president, told the house armed services committee:

"I don't endorse civil disobedience, but I don't think it will be limited to objections on the color line. Many conscientious Americans will follow a civil disobedience program."

Grant Reynolds, a New York negro, told the committee yesterday many negroes will refuse to be drafted if segregation is not abolished. He said a campaign has been started to get pledges against military service unless segregation is ended.

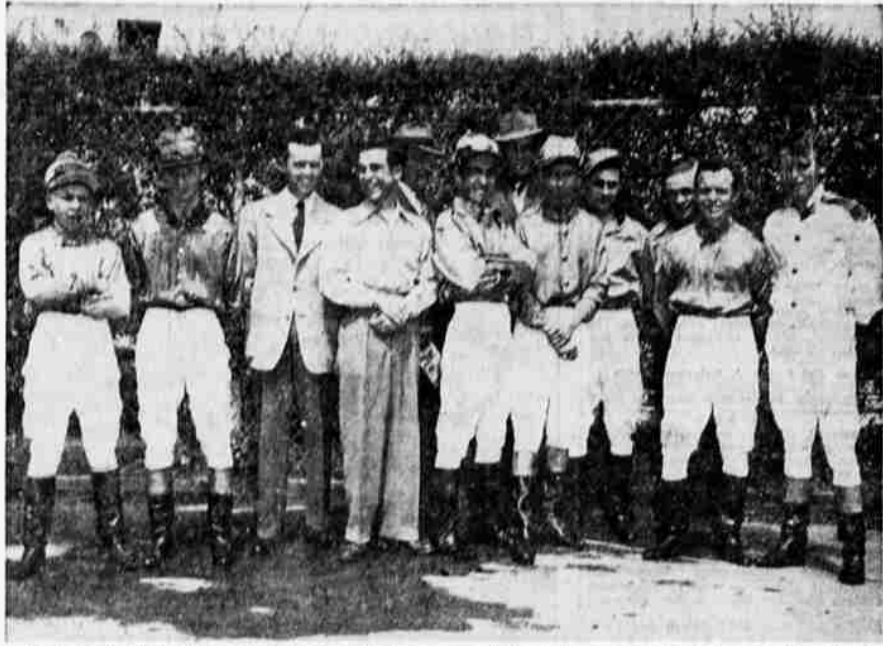
In other developments, Chairman Taft (R-Ohio) told reporters after a meeting of the senate republican policy committee:

1. An overall draft-universal military training law probably will not be ready for senate action before July 15.

2. Senate GOP leaders hope to hold military costs to \$13,500,000,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1. The administration has estimated costs at \$14,000,000,000.

3. There is a sharp dispute between GOP leaders as to whether to go ahead with house-approved legislation for a 70-group air force, instead of 55 groups asked by the administration, or to await completion of an overall military program, including draft and UMI.

Body Found At Crescent Thought Cafe Worker

State police and coroner's officers went to Crescent Tuesday morning to examine the portions of a human body found scattered in the woods there Monday afternoon.

The bones have been tentatively identified as remains of Earl Lauritz Christensen, about 30, a former cafe worker at Klamath Falls who is believed to have perished in the Northern Klamath county wilderness late last fall or in the early winter.

State police said the bones were found near an abandoned ranch by two men who reported to the officer at Gilchrist. Portions of the skeleton, including leg bones with shoes attached, were scattered in the brush, and the officers believe the body had been torn apart by coyotes.

Identification was indicated by a social security card and a restaurant workers union card located in the shreds of clothing found with the bones.

The card had been issued by the local union here, and police checked immediately with Alma Sweetman, union official. She recalled that Christensen was here last fall and worked as a dishwasher at a number of cafes. He lived for a time at the Anchor hotel.

Christensen suffered from violent seizures, and spent three days in Klamath Valley hospital in late October. That is the last record of his being here.

There was no immediate explanation of how he got into the wilderness area or the cause of his death. The skull was missing, but the union and security cards were considered as fairly certain evidence of identification. Christensen evidently had no relatives here, and he had not been reported missing.

Christensen was a World War II veteran.

Autopsy To Be Performed

District Attorney Clarence Humble Tuesday ordered an autopsy on the remains of Thomas Jefferson Hathaway, Klamath Falls barber shop owner, who was found dead in his bed at 8 a. m. today (Tuesday), at 1929 Words.

The body bore evidence of a recent beating. Deputy County Coroner Willard Ward said both eyes were black, there was an injury to the nose and general facial abrasions.

Hathaway was proprietor of Tomny's barber shop, 804 Klamath, which occupies space in the Pastime pool hall. It is understood that Hathaway had not been at his shop for several weeks. Just when the beating occurred, and others involved, was not learned.

Ward's has charge of the body. The autopsy will be conducted either Tuesday night or Wednesday morning. Hathaway was about 35 years of age.

Horses Die In Barn Fire

BURKILLVILLE, R. I., April 21 (AP)—At least two men were reported missing by police and an undetermined number of valuable race horses perished in a fire which swept four Pascoag track barns early Tuesday.

Two valuable animals were killed—one by a fire truck and the other by an automobile—after they fled from the burning structures.

A number of high-priced horses, which raced out of the burning buildings, were running wild through fields in nearby Pascoag and Chepachet.

The missing men were believed to be stablehands. Associates said they apparently were trapped when the flames flashed through the four structures.

The Pascoag track is used to house horses now competing in the Lincoln Downs track nearby.
