

Soft Coal Miners Still Idle, But Normal Work Seen In Near Future

PITTSBURGH, April 21 (AP)—Widespread idleness throughout the soft coal fields today followed John L. Lewis' wish for an immediate work return—but signs were strong that normal operations of mines was not far off.

In several states, locals of the United Mine Workers scheduled meetings today to vote on work resumption. Many union officials expected full production to be re-

stored by tomorrow, or Monday at the latest. Some thought normal crews would be at work late today. Lewis, president of the UMW, last night sent telegrams to district presidents saying: "I do hope you will convey to each member my wish that they immediately return to work."

Resentment
That message, close on the heels of the \$1,420,000 fines meted out to Lewis and the union on contempt of court charges, found thousands upon thousands of miners idle to show their resentment.

In some places, response to the Lewis message was immediate. But in many other mining centers, particularly Western Pennsylvania, where many miners refused to work this morning, the diggers waited to learn the decision of local sessions.

At a few spots, a non-work movement was reported.
At Hazleton, Pa., in the anthracite fields, about 800 men failed to work at four operations. Some 300 miners, members of local 523 at Barton, Md., voted to remain idle for an indefinite period.

Return Seen
Sam Caddy, UMW district president at Lexington, Ky., predicted a full scale return to work tomorrow at Kentucky Miners.

Local 1840 at Bellaire, Ohio, met but did not vote on the Lewis telegram. Instead it talked about the fine of \$1,420,000 which Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough imposed on Lewis and the UMW yesterday, after their conviction for contempt of court.

"Judge Goldsborough is unfit to sit on a federal bench," one union official thundered. "His robe should be removed and he should be taken from the bench."

Parolee Waives Hearing

John L. Welch of Bly, a parolee from Oregon state prison, Tuesday afternoon waived a preliminary hearing in justice court on a bad check charge and indicated he intended to plead guilty in circuit court.

Welch is held in the county jail in lieu of \$1000 bail. He was arrested Monday and booked for parole violation.

Vetoes Budget

MORO, April 21 (AP)—A rural school county budget of \$345,004.88 was rejected yesterday by Sherman county voters.
