Stock Prices Move Up

NEW YORK, April 22 (AP)—Stock prices moved up all along the line today in one of the fastest markets in the last year and a half.

Closing quotations were at peak levels for 1948 or longer on gains of fractions to around two points. The market got off to a rapid opening, calmed down a bit at slightly lower levels, and then surged ahead in the final few minutes of trading.

The performance of the market indicated to many Wall Streeters that inflationary thought was still dominant.

Demand for common stocks is a traditional response to the belief that the general price curve is rising, they pointed out. This group holds that the February price break was merely an interruption—welcome but temporary—to a still further advance.

Aluminum Strike May Be Called

VANCOUVER, April 22 (AP)—AFL workers in all Aluminum Company of America plants have voted to strike if necessary to gain wage demands, the local council president said today.

Lloyd Hinds, president of the Vancouver Aluminum Trades council, said plants involved were here and at Massena, N. Y., East St. Louis, Ill., Lafayette, Ind., and Crassano, Pa. He said this might not be the total number but he had no further details.

The Vancouver membership approved a strike by a 10 to 1 margin, he said. This morning he received a telegram from Business Agent Henry Olsen, attending a meeting of the International Council of Aluminum Workers at Louisville, Ky., saying workers at all AFL-managed Alcoa plants had approved strike action—to be taken if contract agreement is not reached.
