

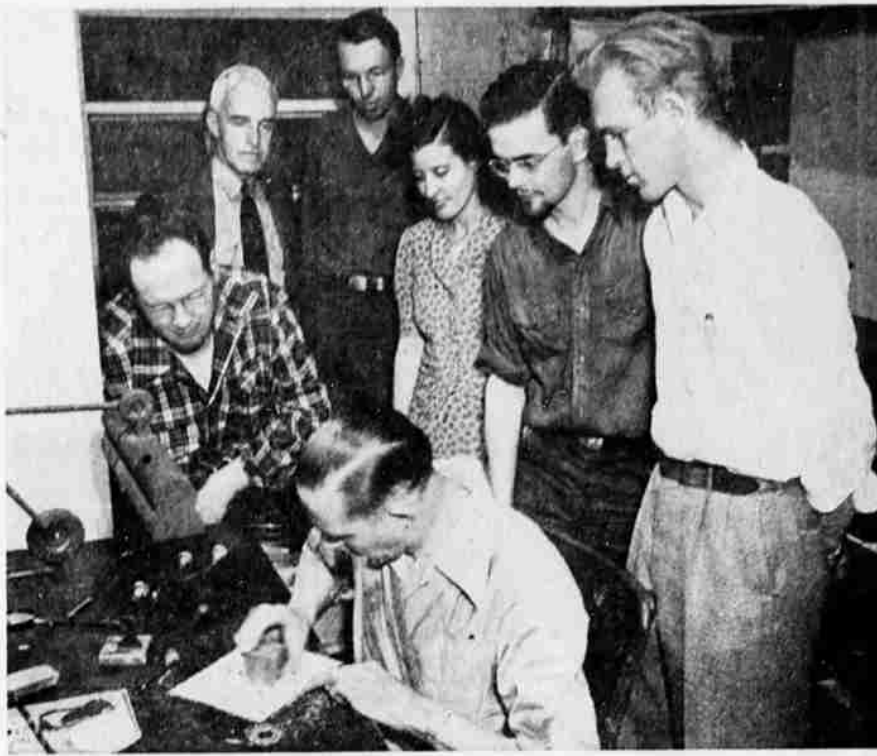
Extravaganza Slated Tonight

Truman Okays Red Meet—In Washington

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—President Truman reiterated Thursday his willingness to meet with Premier Stalin in Washington, and his unwillingness to leave the country for such a conference.

As he has said many times before, the president repeated again to a news conference that he would be glad to see the Soviet leader any time Stalin wants to come to Washington.

A reporter asked whether he was willing to see the Soviet leader here or anywhere else.

Mr. Truman replied that he did not expect to go outside of the United States to attend any conference.

He said again that he would be glad to see Stalin if the latter came to this country.

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Troop Use Power Held To Be Legal

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), told the senate Thursday that President Truman probably has authority to send United States troops to maintain order in Palestine without consent of the congress.

At the same time, Vandenberg said in reply to questions that he had not "been consulted" about such use of troops in Palestine or about the partition of the Holy Land between Jews and Arabs.

Vandenberg said there is a general constitutional power of the president to send troops outside the United States to protect American citizens and property.

He said various presidents had done this from 100 to 125 times without asking authority of congress.

As to the Palestine situation, Vandenberg said:

"There is some such authority to send troops resident in the president."

But Vandenberg said this rests in a "twilight zone" of presidential authority that frequently has been challenged in the past.

Administration officials have predicted that Mr. Truman will ask congress to approve any use of American troops in Palestine.
