

Girl Scout Organization To Switch To Association Council Form Government

An important change in the local Girl Scout organization is in the making. The form of government is to be changed from the present traditional style of council to a more representative association council form. Plans for the first meeting of the new association council were discussed and approved at the board meeting of April 19, and the date set for Monday, May 3.

A council meetings committee has been working out the details and eliminated its study with a dinner meeting at the home of the commissioner, Mrs. James Plummer. Mrs. Charles Fyock was elected chairman of the committee by the rest of the members, Mrs. George Condrey, Mrs. E. H. Shipley, Mrs. Charles Wamstad, Mrs. Ted DeMerritt and Mrs. Charles Fyock.

A dinner, which the committee promises will be delicious and unusual, will open the meeting of May 3 at the Klamath Union high school at 6:30. All adults working in Girl Scouting are invited to come with wives and or husbands, and to bring dishes and silver for themselves and 50 cents to cover the cost of the home cooked food.

Reservations must be in the Girl Scout office, phone 4541, by Saturday, May 1, and it is hoped that they will pour in, because this first association council meeting is important in laying the groundwork for a new organization.

The present system is that a board of directors, made up of several committee heads and officers, meets once a month to formulate policies and procedures, which are handed down to other adult workers such as troop leaders. In the future, all adult workers will have an active part in directing the local policy-making activities. Leaders, committee members, neighborhood chairmen, program consultants, troop committee members and other volunteer workers will compose the Girl Scout Association council which will meet every four months and will have a president, 1st, 2nd and 3rd vice president, secretary, treasurer. From this council will be elected the board of directors which will be made up of the following committee chairmen: finance, membership, nominating, organization, out-of-doors, program, public relations, staff and office, registration and training, as well as the staff and director of the Girl Scout office. This board of directors will meet once a month during the months the association council does not meet, and will have the same officers as the council. The benefit from this change will be in much closer contact with the volunteer workers, enabling them to have an active voice in Girl Scout government, and giving them a clearer picture of the accepted Girl Scout policies.

This plan, which is gradually being adopted over the United States, has been under consideration for Klamath Falls for over three years, beginning under the supervision of Florence McConahey, executive secretary. In January of 1947 Mrs. Thomas Parker, executive secretary at that time, appointed a steering committee to work further on it, and it is that committee which now announces that the organization is ready to convert from the traditional form to the association form. Andrew Collier is chairman, with Dr. A. O. Roenicke, Mrs. Arnold Gralapp, Mrs. L. A. Murphy and Hazel Morrison, members.

Waterways Program OK'd

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—The senate appropriations committee Thursday adopted, without change, a subcommittee's recommendation for a \$641,067,000 waterways construction program for the 12 months beginning July 1.

Senator Gurney (R-S.D.), chairman of the subcommittee, announced the full committee's acceptance of the recommendation. The vote, he said, was 16-3.

He did not identify the members of the committee who voted against the report.

Gurney said not a word or a figure of the subcommittee's recommendation was changed by the full committee.

Durr Quits FCC Post

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—Clifford L. Durr, whose wife is supporting Henry A. Wallace for president, is retiring as a member of the federal communications commission. President Truman made this known at a news conference today.

Mr. Truman said he offered to reappoint Durr in a White House talk yesterday, but that Durr told him he could not remain in government and raise his family on the salary paid by his post.

Previously, Presidential Secretary Charles G. Ross told reporters that activities of Mrs. Durr had had nothing to do with the president's talk with the FCC member.

Durr's term will expire June 30.

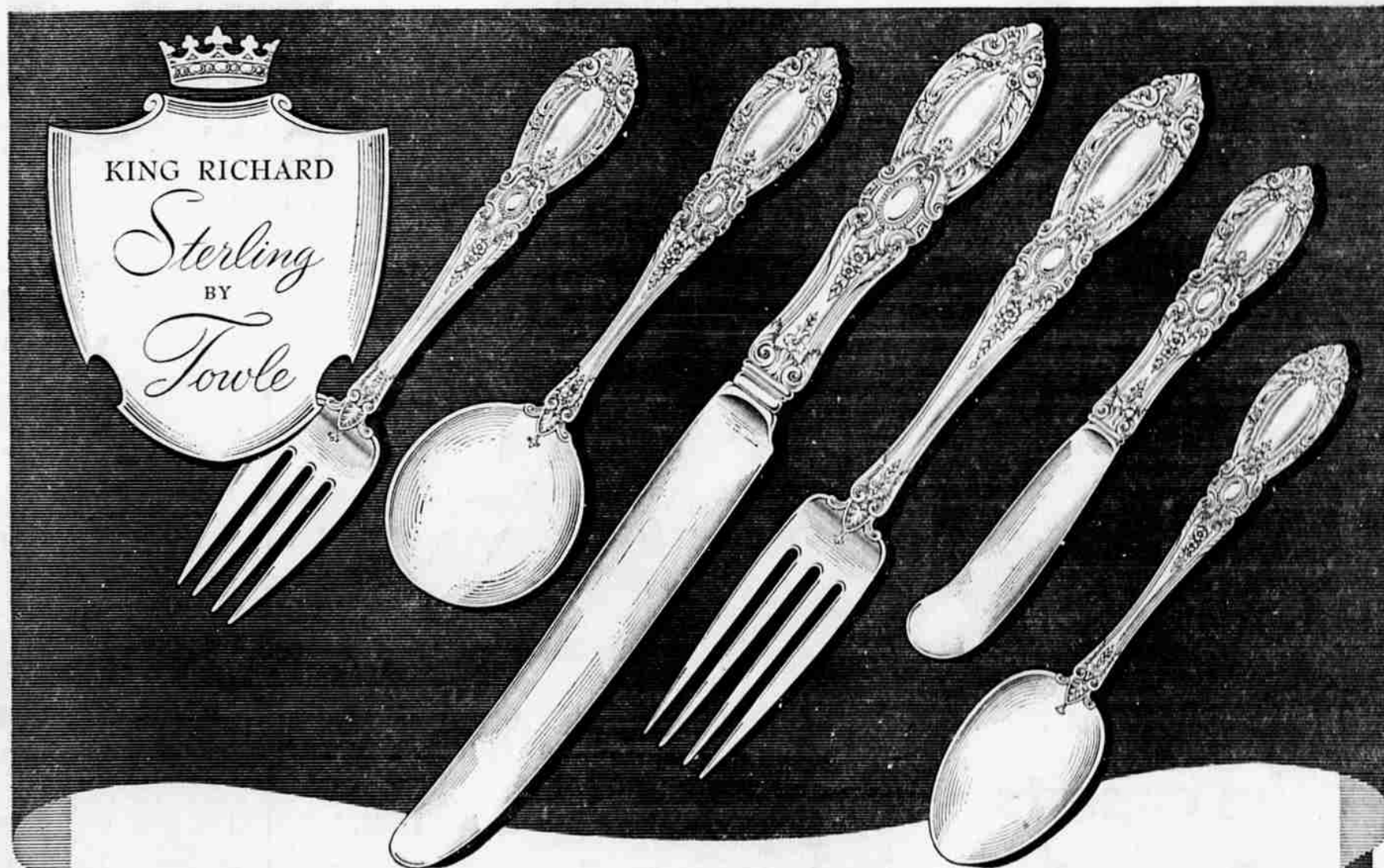
