Lewis Stalls Fund Meeting

WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP)—John L. Lewis today postponed a miners' welfare fund trustee meeting until Monday after his \$100 monthly miners' pension plan ran into a court challenge.

The mine leader had called the meeting for this afternoon, presumably to take steps toward starting payments of the pensions from the still-untapped \$32,000,000 welfare fund.

Extra Van Horn, trustee for coal

mine owners who filed the court suit attacking the pension plan, said Lewis suddenly changed the time of the meeting from 4:30 p. m. today to the same hour Monday.

Van Horn told a reporter that Lewis, who is chairman of the trustee board, gave no reason for the action.

The report of a possible delay in pensions came as soft coal diggers streamed back to the pits in answer to Lewis' return-to-work call. Field estimates showed about 200,000 mines going back to work. This brought the number on the job to about 330,000 of a total of 400,000 miners.

Van Horn served notice yesterday that Lewis and Sen. Styles Bridges, (R-N.H.), the neutral trustee, might be personally liable for any money

spent from the fund under a plan Lewis and Bridges approved. Van Horn made request in a court suit in which he claimed the plan is illegal.

Fisherman Safe After Boat Sinks

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 22 (AP)—A British Columbia fisherman, who clung helplessly to the mast of his slowly-sinking gillnetter for 26 hours, was rescued yesterday in Howe sound 10 miles northwest of here.

The fisherman, Patrick Kelly, Steveston, B. C., said three boats passed fairly close to him before he was seen by the Canadian Pacific steamer Princess Elaine.
