

Black Snow Eradicators Could Be Installed At Heating Plant In City

"Black snow" eradicators can be installed at the Consumers Heating company plant if another \$30,000 in common stock of the company is subscribed. Dick B. Miller told directors of the chamber of commerce Wednesday.

Miller, who is close to the affairs of the company, reviewed the operation of the plant since it was taken over by a large group of local people from the Hood interests.

The first big problem, he pointed out, was to assure a continuance of

operation of the central heating utility. Only enough money was originally subscribed to make this possible, and there was no fund for installing equipment to control the soot.

Progress Shown

Although the utility had been having difficulty for years, under the new management it has been making constructive progress, Miller reported. Heating efficiency was greatly increased and the Consumers Heating company is now on a sound financial footing and worthy of investment, Miller commented.

Miller said it will take about \$30,000 to install the proper devices to eliminate the widely publicized soot nuisance insofar as it is caused by the Consumers Heating company stacks. The company, he said, knows exactly what must be done.

Not all of the "black snow" comes from the heating company operation, Miller said, but admitted much of it does, and public interest in eliminating the nuisance, along with the soundness of the investment, should stimulate sale of additional common stock.

Some Refused

He added that a number of business men who complain about "black snow" refused to subscribe to stock when the operation was being put on its feet by local people.

Miller paid tribute to Glenn Lorenz, who has headed the program at the heating plant established when the new organization took over. Lorenz, he said, does far more for this community than most people realize.

Directors of the chamber voiced much interest in Miller's report. No action of the chamber was indicated, but it was agreed that the sale of more common stock should be generally recommended in the business district.

Concert Association Meeting Slated

A check-up meeting for workers of the Klamath Community Concert association is scheduled for tonight, Thursday, at 8 o'clock at the chamber of commerce.

Concert headquarters reports a fine response for the 1948-49 series and names of artists for next year's series will be announced at the close of the campaign.

A half-hour program, starting at 9:30 p. m. Thursday over KFLW, will feature artists who have been here or are expected to appear in Klamath Falls.

Inland Empire Contracts Signed

SPOKANE, April 22 (AP)—Five Inland Empire lumber operators have signed new 1948 contracts and negotiations are under way with four others, Orley D. Armstrong, business agent of the CIO International Woodworkers of America, said today.

The new contracts call for an increase of 12½ cents an hour in all cases, Armstrong said. This brings the district's top minimum to \$14.25 or \$13.75, depending on the previous contract.

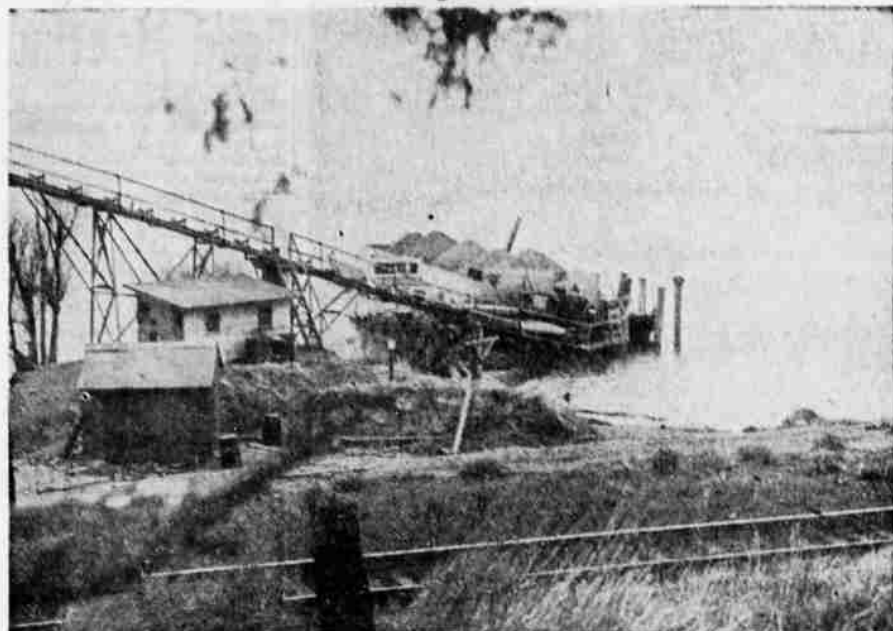

Secret Plant Strike Ends

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., April 22 (AP)—Workmen returned to a secret military construction project outside Albuquerque today to end a 10-day walkout.

Settlement of a dispute idling 700 men was announced late last night in a joint statement from the six unions involved and the contractor, the Peter Kiewit company of Omaha, Neb.

The construction job is near the army's Sandia base, a special weapons project. Military spokesmen have declined to identify it further. The work stoppage began April 12 when 58 carpenters struck in support of demands for a 25-cent increase in their \$1.75 hourly wage. Other unions honored the carpenters' picket line.

W. H. Wright, attorney for the Kiewit company, said the firm boosted the carpenters' pay to \$2 and met the prevailing local wages for members of the other unions.

400 Attend Catholic Conference

BAKER, April 22 (AP)—Over 400 persons from Baker, Union, Umatilla, Grant, Malheur and Harney counties were here today for the ninth annual conference of the Fraternity of Christian Doctrine of the Catholic church. The session here is one of three meetings of the conference scheduled in the diocese of Baker City.

A session was held at The Dalles April 20 and another will be conducted at Klamath Falls April 27. The Baker conference is for priests, sisters and laity and its theme is "parents as teachers of religion in the home."
