U. S. Steel, Westinghouse Slash Prices

PITTSBURGH, April 23 (AP)—Price slashes by the giant U. S. Steel corporation, followed by similar action by Westinghouse Electric corporation, today focused new attention on attempts to lasso cost of living advances.

"Big Steel" yesterday disclosed a wide variety of its products—from barbed wire to steel used in autos—will be cut an annual total of \$25,000,000 May 1. At the same time the corporation turned down demands of the CIO-United Steelworkers for an unspecified pay boost.

Westinghouse said its customers will save about \$3,125,000 a year from reductions it is putting into effect at once. The decreases will average five per cent on electrical products used in connection with electric power distribution.

Vice President T. I. Phillips said price decreases were made possible "through increased efficiency and improvements in manufacturing methods."

Mrs. Colvin Dies At 80

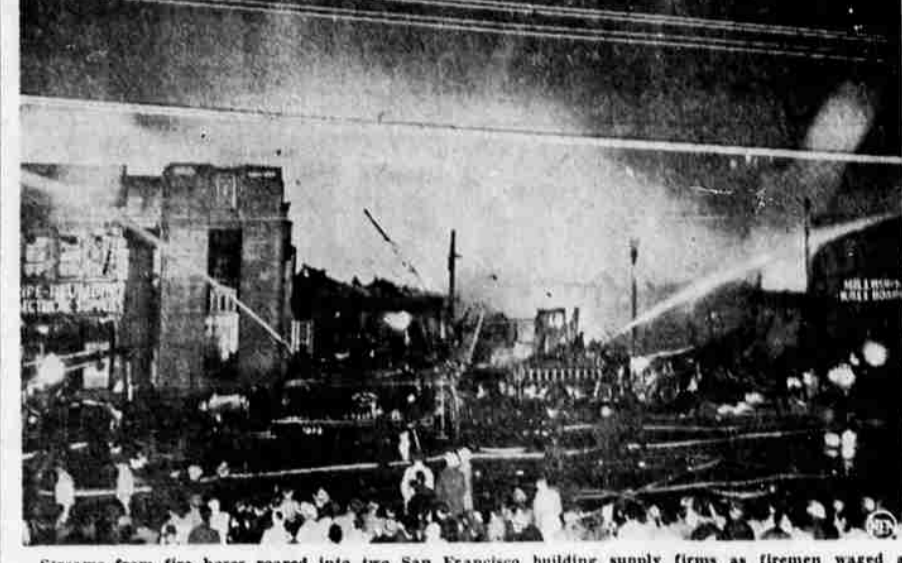

\$300,000 Loss In Big S. F. Fire



Streams from fire hoses roared into two San Francisco building supply firms as firemen waged an hour's battle to subdue a blaze which caused damage estimated between \$225,000 and \$300,000. KANSAS CITY, Kas., April 23 (AP)—Police, under orders to "get tough" in the packing house strike, clashed with CIO strikers in front of the Cudahy & Co., plant today and then cleaned out a union headquarters.
