"American industry now realizes that one of the most critical decisions it makes comes when a person is hired," stated Arnold Gralapp, city superintendent of schools, as he addressed the American Association of University Women at their luncheon meeting Saturday, April 17, at the Pelican.

Industry realizes its responsibility in the human relations field toward its workers, and particularly toward young people approaching the problem of making a living. He continued by advising that the personnel departments of all the great industries he visited on his recent "Flying Classroom" trip were alert and anxious to have an employee happy and contented at work at his own choice. To this end, industry believes that high school years should be exploratory, so that a boy or girl can find the field of work to which he or she is best suited, and that training should come later.

Mr. Gralapp also heard Chief of Staff General Omar Bradley at Atlantic City on his recent trip, who stated that the concentration of industry makes us vulnerable in case of war, and essential industries are already being decentralized. General Bradley also stated that although we made an honest attempt to get our full military strength into the field during the last war, it was a matter of many months and that when the next emergency comes it will be a matter of hours or days at the most that will decide whether or not we will exist as a nation.

On the subject of decentralization, Mr. Gralapp advised that American Air Lines believes that in 20 years planes will move at a speed of 1500 miles an hour, and that passengers will commute from cities of no more than 200,000 population to great cultural areas which will serve many towns and even countries of the world, bringing about better understanding between them.

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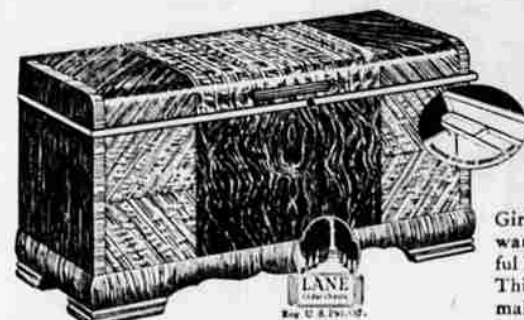
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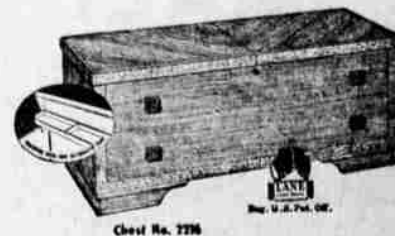
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
