Stassen In Portland Now

PORTLAND, April 26 (AP) — Presidential aspirant Harold E. Stassen today opened his bidding for Oregon's republican May 21 preferential vote, his first test in a far western state.

Stassen is opposed in the Oregon primary by Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York. At stake are 12 national convention delegates.

The former Minnesota governor, who captured the party's endorsement in Wisconsin and Nebraska balloting, said on arriving here last night he was enthusiastic over his Oregon prospects. He opened state headquarters today and speaks tonight at a public rally.

Stassen said last night he was satisfied with a decision of Dewey managers not to hold any conference with him at this time. Stassen said his suggestion for a conference was in the interest of party unity.

Stassen will return east tomorrow to renew his campaign against Senator Robert Taft in Ohio's May 4 primary.

Gov. Dewey is due in Oregon May 1 to start a 10-day state tour. His aides have been here a week planning the campaign.

DETROIT, April 26 (AP)—The high board standings of the American bowling congress were conspicuous today for their omission of a name—Andy Varipapa's.

The famous New Yorker, world match game champion, missed his three week-end appearances, failing to post a 600 and losing a chance to overtake Chicago's Joe Wilman in the tea-year averages.

Andy got only 1547 for his all-events. He rolled 582 in singles, 599 in doubles, and 566 in the team event as his New York Mineralites aggregated a modest 2781.

In the ten-year averages Wilman leads with 20527. Varipapa is second with 20368.

Herald-News Survey Made On Saturday

Fifteen students from the University of Oregon conducted interviews with more than 400 Herald and News readers Saturday in a readership survey sponsored by the newspaper and directed by the division of Journalism, Stanford University.

Friday's edition of the paper was used in the survey. The students showed the paper to the reader, and got him to report which stories, features, editorials, pictures, cartoons, advertisements, etc., received his attention.

The interviews were conducted in various parts of the city and suburbs with the idea of getting a cross-section report. Time did not allow the interviewers to go into the country or to towns other than Klamath Falls.

The students reported that Klamath people were most cooperative, and The Herald and News today expresses its appreciation to the readers who were interviewed for the help they gave.

Many hours of work will go into tabulation of the results of the interviews, which will be conducted at Stanford University.

The survey here is part of a readership study conducted by Dr. Bush for Hometown Daily Newspapers, San Francisco, an organization of which The Herald and News is a member. Papers being surveyed in the current study include the Carlsbad, N. M., Current Argus; Reno, Nevada, Gazette and Journal; Santa Rosa, Calif., Press Democrat; Walla Walla, Wash., Union Bulletin and The Herald and News.
