

Lana Turner To Marry Bob Topping

HOLLYWOOD, April 26 (AP)—Lana Turner of the million-dollar figure and Henry J. (Bob) Topping Jr., of the tin-plate millions, will merge their fortunes today in a tinsied Hollywood wedding.

The 28-year-old actress and the wealthy sportsman, 34, each will be starting a fourth matrimonial venture. And they'll get off in grand style—with typical filmland trimmings.

The ceremony is scheduled for 2 p. m. (PDT) in the Bel-Air home of Publisher William B. Wilkerson, the man who first discovered Lana hanging over a soda fountain 11 years ago.

The screen's foremost sweater girl will wear a tulle gown of champagne hue for this production.

Daughter There

Adding to the ceremony will be the appearance of Lana's five-year-old daughter, Cheryl, as flower girl. That's Cheryl Crane, Lana's baby by Stephen Crane—twice her husband. Arlie Stine was her first.

Topping was parted from his third wife, former actress Arline Judge, last Friday. Arline got a \$100,000 divorce and \$100,000 alimony.

The festive board will groan with the weight of lobsters flown from Boston and assorted delicacies from New York and Louisiana.

After the cocktails and reception, the former Hollywood high school girl who rose to stardom will don part of her \$25,000 trousseau and prepare to leave on a New York-London honeymoon, with Palm Springs, Calif., the first stop.

Embezzlers Get Off Easy On Tax Deal

NEW ORLEANS, April 26 (AP)—A swindler must pay income tax on the proceeds of his scheme but an embezzler doesn't.

The U. S. fifth circuit court of appeals made the ruling when two Texans asked to recover taxes paid on \$272,200.

James A. Akers of Bexar county said he had embezzled the money from Mrs. Dora Roberts, wealthy 44-year-old widow. The government argued, and the court held, that he swindled it.

Differentiating embezzle and swindle, the court said in an embezzlement title to the money does not pass to the embezzler. Hence he does not have to pay income tax on it. In a swindle, however, the court said, title does pass to the swindler and tax must be paid.

Akers and his wife, Lela Akers, therefore are not entitled to recover any of the taxes Akers paid after he had been convicted of income tax evasion, the court decided.

Akers is immune, however, the court said from legal action in the swindle because of a Texas statute of limitation.

The swindle occurred, the court said, between 1932 and 1936 when Akers and a confederate obtained the money from the Howard county widow as "expenses" in a scheme to recover gold allegedly buried on the widow's ranch.

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Link River Runs Almost Dry Again



Favorite old-time story about Link river tells how it used to go dry when the south wind held Upper Klamath lake water back of the reef that was later blown out in connection with power development. Link river was almost as dry the other day, when this picture was taken. As in the old times, Copco had opened the Keno regulating dam to pull down Klamath river, and Link river was extremely low. Ray Telford, shown in the picture, says that the rock dams visible in the river were formed by the Indians long ago to make pools to facilitate fishing when the river was low. Salmon used to come up from the ocean, and Indians would hook them out of the "traps." The rock piles were probably made by squaws, lugging one rock at a time. Telford, who came here in 1904, remembers seeing a woman pushing a baby buggy across the dry Link river bed. One time, he says, the river stayed dry two days.

Proper Use Of Drugs May Cut Heart Disease Deaths

SAN FRANCISCO, April 26 (AP)—Proper use of the drugs heparin and dicumarol can save at least 40,000 Americans a year who otherwise would die of coronary heart disease, says Dr. Irving S. Wright of Cornell medical college.

Dr. Wright reported on his experiments with the two anti-blood clotting drugs to the closing meeting yesterday of the American College of Physicians.

Total coronary deaths in the United States at present run from 250,000 to 300,000 a year, the specialist estimated. Heparin is derived from liver. Dicumarol is found in decayed clover and now is produced synthetically. Dr. Wright said in 800 cases of coronary attack one group received the drugs and another did not. Those treated had only 13 per cent mortality and those not getting the drugs had 23 per cent.

In coronary heart disease death comes when the heart's own supply of blood is blocked by clots. Three thousand of the nation's top specialists in internal medicine have been attending the five-day convention here.

Dr. Myron Prinzmetal of Los Angeles reported yesterday on experiments showing how the heart protects itself in some coronary attacks by shifting its blood supply course from the clot-obstructed main artery.

OSLA, Norway, April 26 (AP)—A former German soldier who hid for the hills when the Nazis in Norway surrendered three years ago has been caught.

The Trondheim newspaper Andressen said Saturday a group of skiers in Central Norway's mountains had found him, wearing furs, long hair and an unkempt beard.

At first, the newspaper said, the German pretended not to understand when the skiers spoke to him. Then he explained he had fled when the Germans surrendered.

For three years he had been living in a cave, fishing and hunting. trace of the craft was found, coast guard headquarters reported.
