Thieves Nab \$12,460 Loot

PORTLAND, April 27 (AP)—Two well-dressed, masked men bound and gagged the wife of a night club operator and made off with \$12,460 worth of furs and jewelry last night, Mrs. Al Winters reported to police. She said she was awakened at her home by the men who demanded "the diamond ring you were wearing tonight."

She said that after telling them the ring was in a safe deposit vault and she had no money, she watched as one of the men took a suitcase from a closet and filled it with furs and jewelry. The other kept a gun pointed at her, she said.

Mrs. Winters listed her losses as two mink coats valued at \$6,000 and \$2,500, a fur neckpiece valued at \$2,000, an ermine jacket valued at \$1,000, miscellaneous jewelry and \$75 in cash.

She said the men, before leaving, bound and gagged her. She later was able to remove the gag and, by knocking a telephone from its stand, telephone police.
