

National Officer To Address PTA

Mrs. J. J. Garland of Menlo Park, California, appearing on the speakers' platform at the Oregon state PTA session here this week, vice president of region 8, is the immediate past president of the California Congress of Parents and Teachers, having served from 1944 to 1946 in this capacity. She has been active in local, district and state PTA work ever since she joined the Menlo Park unit in 1924. After serving as officer, chairman, and historian in her local unit, she became district vice president in 1928 and officiated as district president from 1933 to 1935. In preparation for the state presidency, she had served the California Congress successfully as chairman of high school extension, director of organization, director of education and first vice president. At the national level she has been a member of the war activities and the findings committees. She also served as chairman of the state presidents' conference in 1945-1946.

Mrs. Garland attended State Teachers college at Platteville, Wis., and holds a B.A. degree from the University of Wisconsin where she majored in English and public speaking. Before her marriage she was head of the English department at Sheboygan high school, Sheboygan, Wis. She has given many talks on parent-teacher relationships at state teachers' conferences and annual meetings of administrators and trustees.

In addition to her PTA work, Mrs. Garland gives freely of her time in the civic and welfare organization of her community. She is a past state adviser on women's activities, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, a member of the California youth committee, which is an advisory body to the California youth authority; and a member of the survey committee on school dis-

trict reorganization, San Mateo county, California.

The mother of four children, Mrs. Garland's interests center around homemaking. Collecting silver and early American glass are her chief hobbies.
