Malin

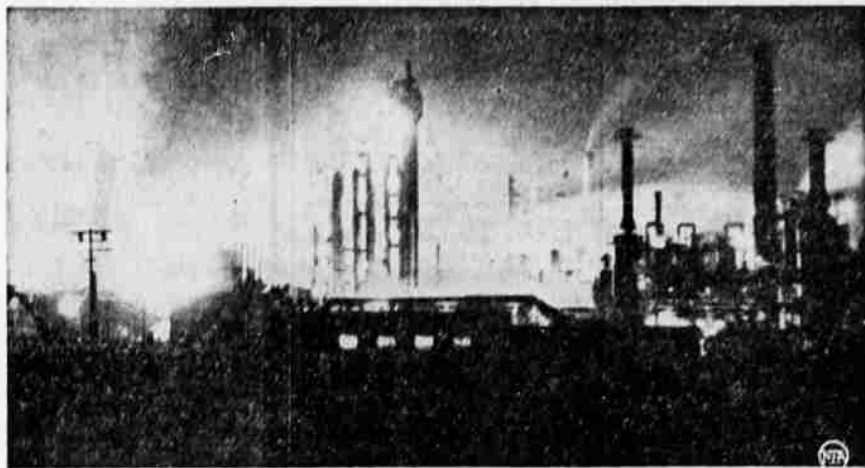

Social Agency Shakeup Asked

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—A shakeup in the social security administration and the U. S. employment service was recommended Tuesday by the house appropriations committee.

Slashings \$20,673,000 off next year's funds for the federal security agency, the committee approved a \$909,050,000 money bill to finance operations starting July 1.

The committee also added a provision barring use of the funds to government workers belonging to a union whose officers have not signed the non-communist oath required by the Taft-Hartley law.

This is the first time the fund-withholding weapon has been used to back up this section of the labor law. In a previous effort to attach an anti-racial discrimination provision to a money bill, the committee was overridden by the house.

The bill includes this specific health and social welfare appropriation: \$700,000 for an immediate survey of what the committee called "rather

serious" health and sanitation conditions in Alaska.

The bill, written by a subcommittee headed by Rep. Keefe (R-Wis.), recommended a "far-reaching overhaul" of the social security administration.

LA Squares Off At Mosquitoes

LOS ANGELES, April 28 (P)—The mosquito, nobody's friend, suffered severe casualties Tuesday as the city of Los Angeles sent its troops and mechanized equipment into the 1948 war against the blanket blank insects.

Spearhead of today's attack, which started on the Los Angeles river bed, was a contraption known as the "plumber's nightmare" because of its intricate sets of tanks and exhaust pipes that are mounted on a jeep.

The attack is going to be continued every 10 days by an 11-man crew from the health department's mosquito control unit. Three new jeeps are being outfitted to lend support to the "plumber's nightmare."

The first day's attack covered a 25-mile stretch of the river bed.
